THE VARSITY RUGBY SQUAD

HAS SUFFERED SOME CASUALTIES AT PRACTICES.

Holmes and Bradford Join Others on Hospital List—Still Hope to Defeat Queen's.

The Toronto Mail and Empire says: With the intercollegiate rugby season opening up here on Saturday when Queen's come to play Varsity, Coach Billy Foulds, of the Blue and White, was very much perturbed last night because of the injuries which have made in his camp. Yesterday in practice, two of the best players were placed on the hospital list, at least temporarily. First Bradford, centre scrumman, was knocked out in a scammed play, and was carried from the field, and then Wendell Holmes, captain pro tem, and one of the few experienced half backs now trying for a place on the team, turned his ankle.

It is to be hoped that both these boys will be able to get back into the game by Friday. Besides there are a number of other players who are nursing torn or strained members. However, Foulds is confident that the Blue and White will come through against the Kingstons. His team has been drilled thoroughly and they are in good condition generally. His line had added considerable weight in the last week, and are standing up well. The question of a man for centre half to combine with Joe Breen and Frank Sullivan in the rear guard division, is a matter of much concern. Varsity needs a player in there that can play the Free Press' punter, McKevey, in check. This nineteen-year-old boy is one of the best in the business, and if Jack Evans, their sterling quarter back, is in the game, they will give a good account of themselves.

With the possibility of Holmes being out of the game with his ankle, both flying wing and centre half will be open. There is lots of material, but for the most part it does not measure up to the mark. McKenzie is the only real punter that Varsity has, but "Red" is liable to turn in a splendid game, and on the other hand, the opposite. One can never tell what he is liable to do. There are a number of punters who can vie with him for distance, until they get behind a scrimmage line, and then they prove only mediocre performers. On top of this "Red" Smylie, the Dental hockey star, announced last night that his studies would not permit him playing rugby this year.

CUP RACE IN JULY

Acceptance of Liptons Challenge is Expected.

The cup committee of the New York Yacht Club, which will meet next week to consider for an America's cup race next summer, will accept the challenge without doubt, according to a report current among yachtsmen in New York. It was considered probable, however, that the races would be held in July, instead of June, and sailed off Newport, instead of Sandy Hook.

Before sailing for England on the liner Baltic, Charles E. Nicholson, designer of the challenger, Shamrock IV, gave the first description made public of the craft.

Details of her construction show lightness was the main consideration. The yacht is virtually without timbers except longitudinal ones, her strength being derived from triple planking—two strakes diagonal and the outer one fore and aft.

24 Years An Umpire.
Tom Conolly, dean of American League umpires, was recently given a gold medal by the American League in token of appreciation of his great ability. Conolly began his career in the New England League in 1895, where he remained four years, and then advanced to the National League, where after three years' service he joined the American League in 1902 and has been with the junior major league ever since.

BASEBALL ARBITERS ASK FOR BETTER PAY

Cast Envious Eyes in Direction Where Harvest Is Being Reaped.

The request of the four umpires officiating in the world's baseball series of games for \$2,000 each instead of \$1,000 is in the hands of the National Commission. A demand has been made on the Commission for the extra \$1,000, the umpires taking the position that, since the series must go more than the customary seven games and the clubs and Commission are reaping a rich harvest, the arbitrators ought to share in the prosperity. No other reason is advanced.

The nine-game series is a better test of the relative strength of the teams than a set of seven games but the attendance today indicates that the interest is not sustained.

It is hinted that the Commission fears that it will lose the suit brought against it by the Baltimore Federals involving the payment to the latter of \$240,000.

It is intimated also that most of the club owners would rather lose the World Series in nine games than win it in six or seven because of the increased profits in a set decided on the basis of the best five in nine. Whereas there is now a possibility of nine games being played, the series would have been over after the fifth game under the old seven-game arrangement.

EACH WINNING PLAYER WILL RECEIVE \$4,881

The players of the winning team of the world's series will receive \$4,881.55 each, while each member of the losing team will get approximately \$2,254.37 as his share. Monday's was the last game in which the players figured in the receipts. This is the largest sum ever received by a player on a winning team in the world's series. The next highest figure was paid the Red Sox players in 1916.

The players this year participate in the receipts of the first five instead of the first four. The players' share this year totals \$260,349.66, of which 75 per cent will be divided between the Reds and the White Sox. Sixty per cent of the remaining 25 per cent will be divided between the Giants and Cleveland Indians, and 40 per cent between the New York Yankees and the Chicago Cubs.

The money to be divided between the Reds and the White Sox totals \$195,262.25. The winners will get 60 per cent. The remaining \$75,984.41 to be divided among the Giants, Indians, Cubs and Yankees, will give the players of the first two clubs about \$990 each, and the players of the Cubs and Yankees about \$600 each.

OTTAWA SWITCH TIGER DATES

The Ottawa football club has decided to change the dates of their matches with the Hamilton Tigers. They will play the Tigers here on Saturday of next week, October 18, instead of going to Hamilton, and will make the Hamilton jaunt on Saturday, October 25th. The change was made at the request of the Tiger club which must give up its grounds on Saturday, October 18th, for the celebration in honor of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales.

NEW PRENUM WITH OTTAWA

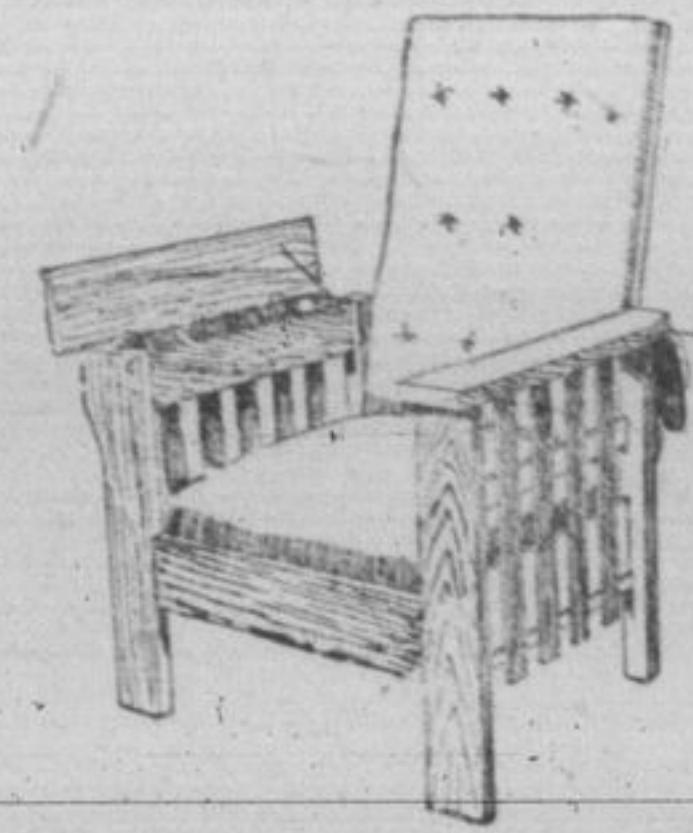

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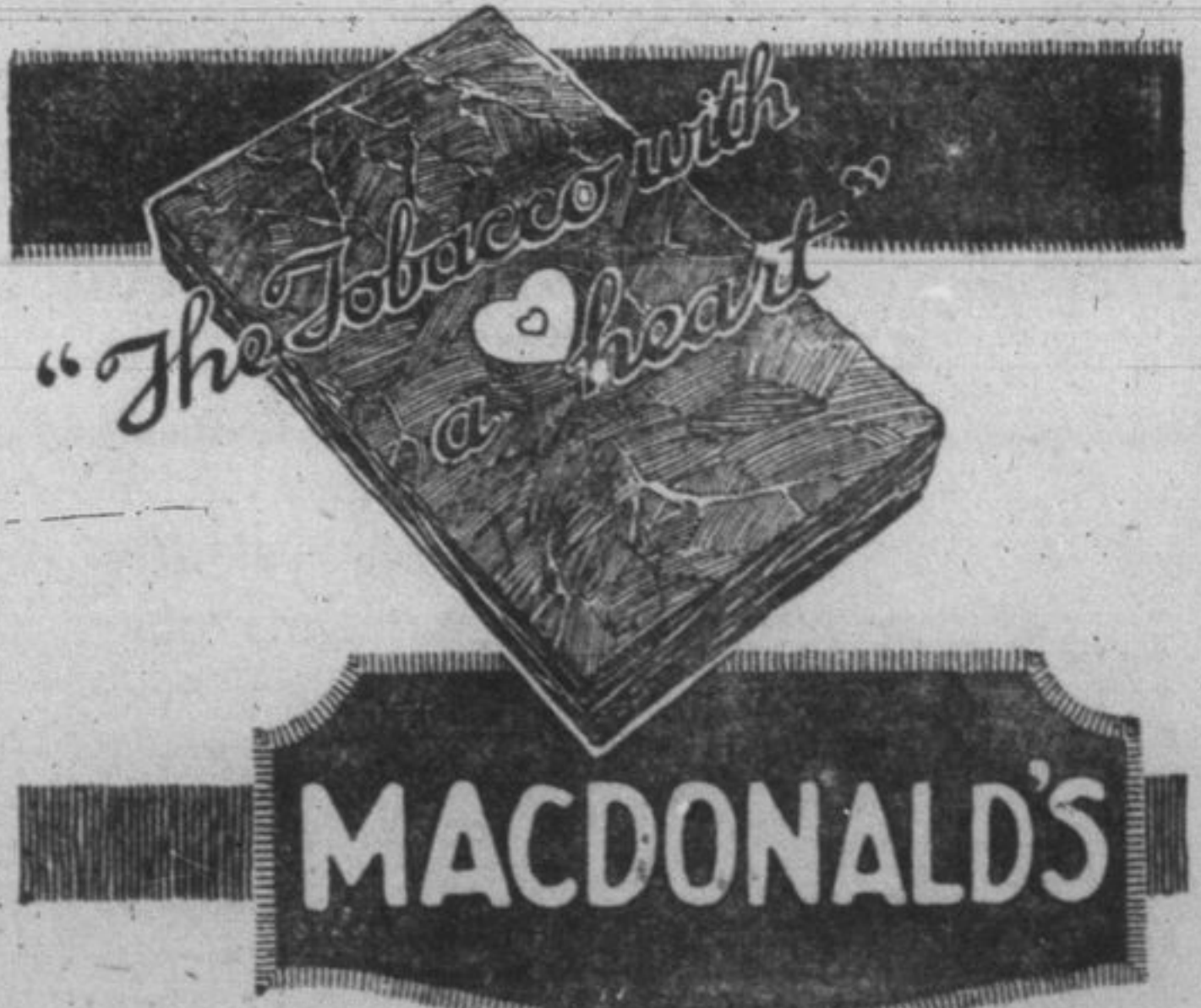
