

General Ross said his appointment as a cabinet minister came to him as a surprise, and an honor to Kingston. His department had not been defined, but he believed that it would very largely have to do with public institutions and returned soldiers. His sympathy turned into this channel. The general declared that Eastern

Ontario owed a good deal to the Hearst Government. He spoke of the support given the School of Mining by the Hearst Government. And at Queen's University he had heard the statement that the Hearst Government had been more liberal to the returned men than that of the Government at Ottawa. In making a review of the last five years, the speaker found that every department of the Ontario Legislature had been most satisfactorily looked after. The make-up of the magazine is changed in no way the only difference being that the style of type is that used on typewriters, and is uniform in all the reading matter throughout the number.

Moreover the right-hand side of each column is irregular, as is an ordinary typewritten copy. Each page is in effect a photograph copy of the original article as written on the typewriter. In their introductory note the publishers intimate
