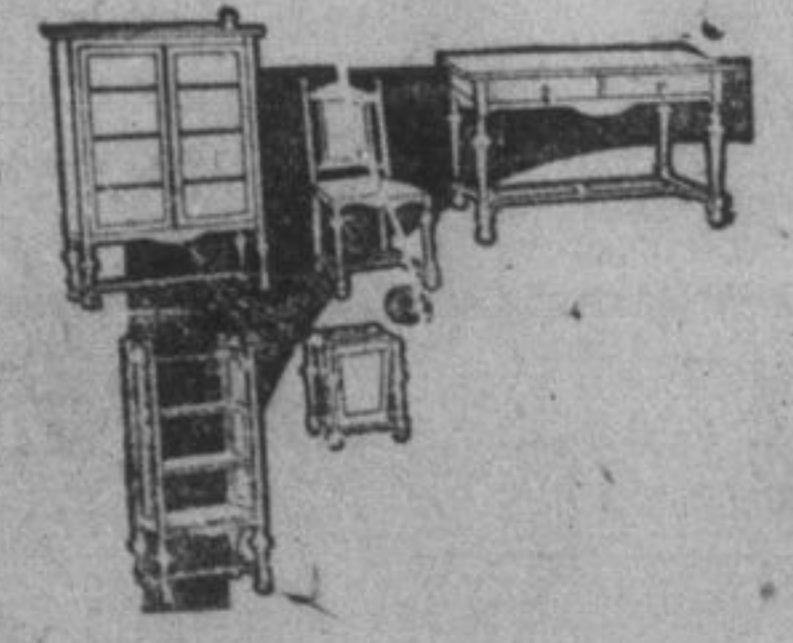

Miss Flora Schofield, of Ottawa, is in town for the ceremonies at Queen's University, and is the guest of Mrs. William McFedridge, Bath Road.

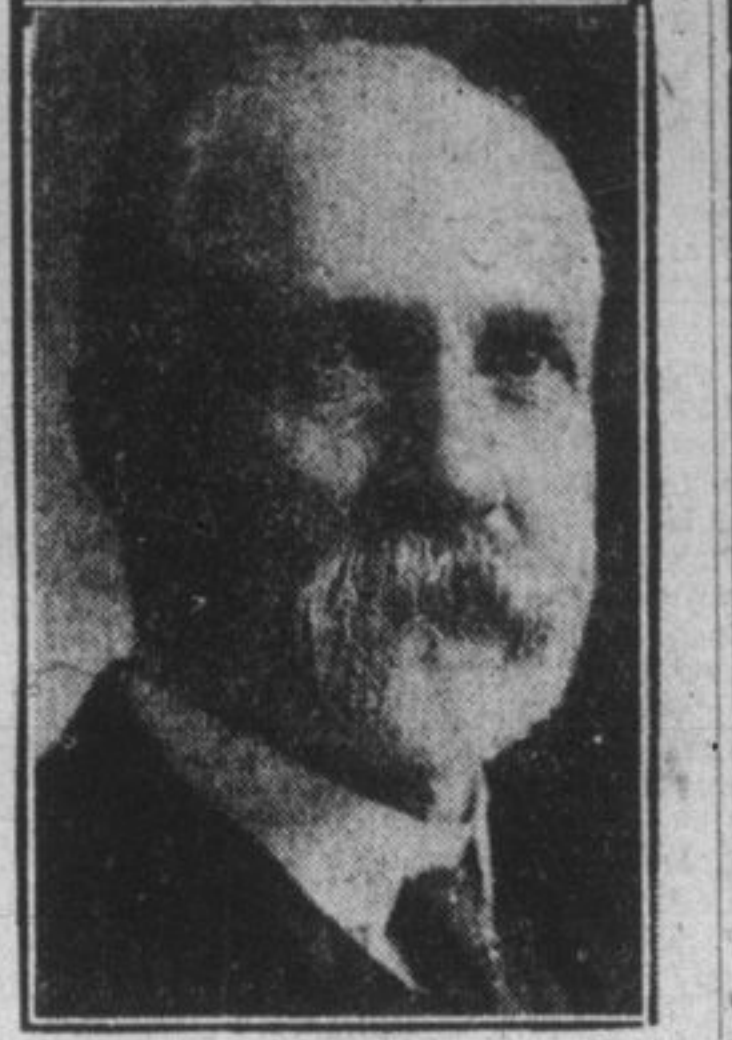

RACE SUICIDE IS MENACE OF FUTURE

Sir Rider Haggard Says Western World Will Be Submerged if It Continues.

London, Oct. 15.—Sir Rider Haggard, giving evidence before the National Birthrate Commission, dwelt on the dangers of artificially keeping down births, which was now widespread in every Western nation except, he said, perhaps, Russia and Germany.

He said he was of the opinion that unless a startling change happened the Western races within the next two centuries would be submerged beneath a great new influx from the teeming myriads of the East.

He doubted the effectiveness of appealing to the conscience of the Empire to stop this race suicide, but thought the State might stamp out diseases tending to sterilize the race, and also subsidize motherhood.

And, as a desperate last resort, the State could, directly or indirectly, bring up all children, even holding out a kind hand to those not born in wedlock.

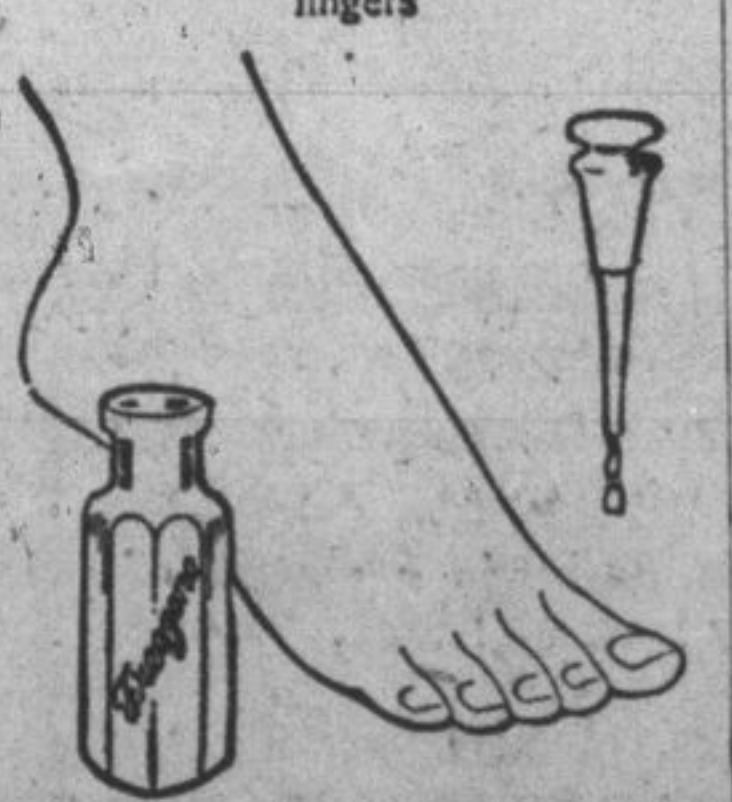
