STUNNED BY LIGHTNING

THE EXPERIENCE OF PARTY DRIVING NEAR FALLBROOK.

Another Party Injured When Their Car Turned Turtle on Their Way to Perth—Car Dropped Twenty Feet Into a Creek.

Fallbrook, Oct. 13.—Mr. Albert Close, his mother Mrs. Close, Mr. Murphy and his sister Miss Murphy had a miraculous escape from death on Friday afternoon. On their way to Perth, Mr. Murphy asked Mr. Close to let him run the car as he wanted to learn how to operate it. They had to cross Mud Lake Bridge, and in some way he steered the car the wrong way. Consequently, he struck the railing, breaking it off and turning the car upside down into the creek. The occupants, with the exception of the driver, were thrown clear of the car. He was pinned under the wheel. It was thought for the moment that all was over with him, but Thos. Ennis, who was digging potatoes in his field heard the crashing and great assistance to Mr. Close, in removing Mr. Murphy from under the car. The car dropped a distance of about twenty feet on some logs in the creek, otherwise it would have been buried in the mud. Dr. Fee was summoned, and after careful examination of those injured, found that their injuries were not of a serious nature. The car was removed from the creek the next day and it was a surprise to all that it ran as well as before. With a new wind shield it will look as good as before the accident.

On Friday evening Robert Anderson, his sister, Mrs. Jessie Anderson and Miss Carrie Duncan, were driving from Perth in a severe electric storm when a heavy bolt of lightning came which frightened the horse. The buggy was upset and the occupants were thrown out all three being so badly stunned by the lightning they were rendered speechless. Geo. Ennis and James Watt, who were driving behind saw the buggy which was badly broken and on looking around soon found the occupants who seemed to be all in a dazed condition. They were placed in Mr. Ennis' buggy and driven to the home of Mr. Walroth in Fallbrook where Dr. Scott, of Lanark, was hurriedly summoned. It was found that Mr. Anderson and Miss Duncan had received the most severe injuries. Miss Jessie Anderson escaped with a slight shaking up. Both of the injured were able to be taken to their homes on Saturday, and it is hoped they will soon recover from the accident.
