

STEAMER CALKINS WAS LOST

BUT THE MEMBERS OF CREW WERE TAKEN OFF SAFELY.

Vessel Was Caught In Big Blow Sunday Night While On Way from Oswego to Belleville—No Difficulty Anticipated In Raising Sunken Schooner.

The schooner Bertha Calkins, well-known vessel at this port, having been engaged in carrying coal to Kingston for many years, was lost in a big storm on Lake Ontario Sunday night, but luckily the members of the crew were saved. A despatch from Belleville says:

"In a big blow Sunday night the schooner Bertha Calkins, of Picton, Captain Van Dusen, master, sprang a leak and sank in twenty-five feet of water, fortunately without any loss of life. The schooner left Oswego with a cargo of 450 tons of coal for the Schuster Company of Belleville, and ran into heavy weather on the lake, the strain, no doubt, opening a seam. Captain Van Dusen successfully navigated his craft to a point near the shore between the gap and Players' Cove and the crew easily reached shore in the ship's boats. No difficulty is anticipated in raising the sunken schooner and bringing the ship and cargo to Belleville."

The Calkins was for several years sailed by Capt. Malcolm Shaw, of Kingston.

CHEMICAL PRODUCTS PLANT AT TRENTON

Company to Erect Large Factory, It Is Said—To Submit By-Law.

Trenton, Oct. 16.—The Chemical Products of Canada, Ltd., which has been negotiating for the British Chemical Co.'s plant, has practically decided to go ahead, it is understood. It proposes employing 2,000 men in connection. It is said, and when the new plant is running about 500 men will be employed at first. The Town Council is ready to submit a by-law on the basis of a fixed assessment of \$200,000 and free taxation except for school taxes, for ten years.

FAWCETT'S FOLLY

And the Farmers of Frontenac.

From the moment the Dominion Government proposed to build a new Welland canal, which will permit the largest grain boats to enter Lake Ontario, Dr. Edwards, M.P., has persistently advocated the building of a government grain elevator at Kingston.

Such an elevator would be of immense value to the farmers of Frontenac, because of the screenings and inferior grain (unfit to ship) which the farmers could get at a very low cost. Every farmer who has been up against the high price of bran and shorts will appreciate this fact. In view of these facts the farmers who attended Mr. Rankin's meetings at Battersa on Monday night and at Barriefield on Tuesday night were astonished to learn that certain members of the U.F.O. in Frontenac had sent petitions to Dr. Edwards, M.P., asking him to use his influence with the Federal Government to have the terminal elevator built in Toronto.

In this connection Dr. Edwards read a letter sent to him by William Fawcett, the U.F.O. candidate, which is as follows:

"Wolfe Island, Ont.,
"Feb. 18th, 1919.

"Dr. Edwards, M.P.:

"Dear Sir—The directors of the United Farmers' Co-operative Company, Limited, passed the following resolution at their last meeting: This resolution is to emphasize strongly the accompanying proposal for an elevator at Toronto for the use of the people. We trust that you will do all in your power to promote this project.

"Hoping you will give this your favorable consideration, I am very respectfully yours,
"William Fawcett."

The petition which accompanied Mr. Fawcett's letter states that the object desired is to give service "particularly to Central and Western Ontario."

How any man seeking to represent the farmers of Frontenac could do as Mr. Fawcett has done is difficult to understand, for if the government builds an elevator in Toronto it will not build in Kingston. The head officials of the U.F.O. live in Toronto or close to that city and want everything for Central and Western Ontario, and Mr. Fawcett is a vote for the west. A vote for Rankin is a vote for Frontenac and Eastern Ontario.—Adv.
