**Induction of Rev. T. J. S. Ferguson.**  
The Presbytery of Lanark and Renfrew met in the Presbyterian church, Lanark, on Tuesday, Oct. 7th, for the induction of Rev. T. J. S. Ferguson, B.A., recently minister of the Presbyterian church, North Bay, into the pastoral charge of the Presbyterian church, Lanark, which now consists of St. Andrew's and Zion congregations united. Rev. Mr. Ferguson is a Queen's University graduate.

**Civil Servants Vote.**  
It having appeared that there was considerable doubt in the minds of revenue collectors and other officials in the Department of Customs as to whether they were prohibited from voting at provincial elections, a ruling was obtained at Ottawa from the Right Hon. Sir George Foster, acting premier of Canada, that there were no regulations prohibiting any civil servant, no matter in what capacity or he may be engaged, from

voting at the election on Monday or from voting on the referendum.

**Depends Upon Moral Supremacy.**  
Rev. Dr. R. J. Wilson, during his sermon in Chalmers church on Sunday morning, declared that the thing that impressed him most in connection with the great installation proceedings at Queen's University last week, was the "sermon" preached by practically every one of the noted men who spoke. Briefly stated it was this: That the Anglo-Saxon supremacy depended upon our race holding moral supremacy.

**A Noted Worshipper.**  
The venerable Rev. Dr. G. M. Milligan, minister emeritus of Old St. Andrew's church, Toronto, was a worshipper in Chalmers church on Sunday morning. Dr. Milligan, when attending Queen's College in the late fifties, used to worship in the old Chalmers church down on Earl street. He became one of Canada's foremost preachers, and for years occupied the pulpit of Old St. Andrew's, Toronto. Dr. Milligan is always a welcome visitor to Kingston and Queen's.

**Soldier's Tribute to Nursing Sister.**  
A pleasing presentation was made at the Lady Stanley Institute, Ottawa, when Nursing Sister Glendine Clement, (daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Clement, of Deseronto), a graduate from that nursing school, was the recipient of a silver thermometer and a silver mounted umbrella, suitably engraved. These gifts were from the soldiers' "B" ward of the Protestant General Hospital, which patients wished to express their appreciation of Miss Clement's services.

**INCREASE IN EMPLOYMENT**

REPORTED IN ONTARIO AND QUEBEC BY LABOR DEPARTMENT

Employment Service of Canada Submits Interesting Report for the Week Ending October 4th—Increase Not as Great as Preceding Weeks.

Reports from employers in Ontario and Quebec, to the Eastern Clearing House, of the Employment Service of Canada, Department of Labour, indicate that, disregarding unemployment due to strikes, there was a further increase in employment in those provinces during the week ending October 4th, which increase, however, was not as great as the increases during the preceding weeks.

Returns for the week ending October 4th, show that 2,891 firms reported to the Employment Service, which firms had 425,579 persons on pay-roll, as compared with 424,913 on pay-roll during the preceding week, and increase of 666 persons or 15 per cent. An increase of 1204 or 3 per cent was anticipated for the week ending October 11th.

Returns for the week ending September 27th, showed that 3,111 firms reported, which firms had 425,239 persons on payroll as compared with 424,340 persons during the preceding week, an increase of 1,049 per-

sons or 24 per cent. An increase of 1,780 persons or 4 per cent, was anticipated for the week ending October 4th, which increase the returns for the week in question show to have been hardly realized.

The plus industries, those that registered net increases in the number of persons employed, with their respective percentage in creases were: Building and construction 1.3 per cent; commercial and mercantile, 4 per cent; clay, glass and stone products 4.2 per cent; leather and leather goods, 5 per cent; metals, 9 per cent; textiles 6 per cent; vehicles, 3 per cent; quarrying and mining 2.1 per cent; railway operation, 4 per cent; and miscellaneous, 3 per cent.

It is noticeable that metals, textiles, quarrying and mining, and vehicles, which groups have been making the greatest gains during the preceding weeks, also made the most appreciable gains during the week ending October 4th. With the exception of vehicles all plus industries expected further gains during the week ending October 11th.

The minor industries, those that registered net decreases in the number of persons employed, with their respective percentage decreases, were Lumbering, 1.9 per cent; food, drink and tobacco, 5 per cent; pulp, paper and printing, 2 per cent; woodwork and construction 4 per cent; and railway construction 3 per cent. Chemicals registered a nominal decrease only. It is noticeable that lumbering registered a decrease during this week, this group having anticipated gains for several weeks, which anticipations have not been realized. The drop in food, drink and tobacco, was due to some extent to the shortage of cans in the canning industry, but also to the completion of the canning season in some lines. Of the minus groups all but food, drink and tobacco; pulp, paper and printing, and chemicals, anticipated gains during the week ending October 11th.

Ontario firms alone, reports from 1968 of which were tabulated, show a gain of 549 persons and a gain of 15.1 per cent or 6 per cent, to have been anticipated for the week ending October 11th. Most groups in Ontario reflect the same tendencies registered in the returns for the two provinces combined. Vehicles, however, reported a decrease of 2.4 per cent, while the combined returns show an increase of 3 per cent for the two provinces. Pulp, paper and printing, woodworking and railway, construction, all show gains in Ontario. With the exception of food, drink and tobacco, and vehicles, all groups anticipated gains during the week ending October 11th.

Quebec firms alone, reports from 923 of which were tabulated, registered a gain of 117 persons, or 1 per cent during the week in question, but anticipated a reduction of 207 persons, 3 per cent during the week ending October 11th. The most noticeable increase in Quebec alone was registered in vehicles, which increase more than made up for the reduction in Ontario in that group. Gains in metals and textiles accounted in part for the gains registered by the two provinces combined. Commercial, mercantile and miscellaneous, in addition to the groups reported as minus industries in the returns from the two provinces, registered slight decreases. The anticipated decreases are largely accounted for by the expected reductions in lumbering, chemicals, vehicles, railway construction and metals. No appreciable gains were anticipated in any group.
