THE OFFICIAL PROGRAMME

FOR THE VISIT OF THE PRINCE OF WALES

His Royal Highness is to arrive at 10 a.m.—The Civic Dinner Will Be At 8.30 p.m.

The details of the programme on the occasion of the visit of His Royal Highness, the Prince of Wales, are as follows:

His Royal Highness, and staff will arrive at the Grand Trunk Railway inner station at 10 a.m. sharp on Saturday and proceed through the public street as follows: Along Ontario street past the City Hall and C.P.R. station, which will be decorated for the occasion; up Brock street to King along King street to Clarence, up Clarence to Wellington, and along Wellington to West, down West street to the Macdonald monument at which point the procession will enter the City Park and cross to Bagot street, returning to West street and thence to the cricket field where the civic reception will take place.

The school children will be assembled on the west end of a platform to be erected and facing south. Here Mayor Newman will read the address and present to His Royal Highness addresses from other organizations among them being the Sons of England. Any society that desires to present an address should hand it to the mayor before Saturday next. The school children will sing three songs, "God Bless the Prince of Wales," "O Canada" and "Rule Britannia." Here the veterans will be inspected and His Royal Highness will present about 100 medals awarded to soldiers in the war for gallant conduct. At 11.20 a.m. the Prince of Wales will kick off the ball in a football game played between two teams of veterans on the cricket field.

From the cricket field the Royal party will proceed up Barrie street to Princess, down Princess to Ontario and along Ontario street to the Royal Military College where His Royal Highness will inspect the cadets and present colours.

At 3 p.m. His Royal Highness will go to the golf links where he will play a game of golf.

At 6.30 Queen's University will confer upon the Prince of Wales the degree of doctor of laws.

At 8.30 p.m. a civic dinner will be tendered to His Royal Highness and staff in the city hall.

The Prince will occupy the second car in the procession and on his left will be seated Mayor H. W. Newman. Find the mayor and you will find the Prince.

On Sunday, His Royal Highness will attend divine service at St. George's cathedral at 11 a.m. and the afternoon will be spent privately.

On Monday morning, the Royal train will leave Kingston at an early hour for Brockville.

DEPOT C. M. R. REUNION

To Be Held at Hamilton on Friday Night.

The names of the ex-members of the Depot Regiment C. M. R. to attend the banquet and smoker, to be held at the Royal Connaught hotel, Hamilton, on Friday, Oct. 24th, at 6 p.m., are rolling in in great style. As an evidence of the widespread interest of this reunion, names of ex-members who intend to be present have been received from points as far away as Ottawa, Owen Sound, Windsor, Detroit and Baltimore. The arrangements for the dinner and programme to follow are being completed, and a specially enjoyable night is being looked forward to.

The Depot Regiment C. M. R., which was commanded by Lt. Col. W. C. Brooks, has the distinction of having recruited and sent more men overseas than any other unit in Canada. From its organization in 1915 until the regiment went over as a unit in November 1917, after having previously sent many drafts, between 3,000 and 3,500 men passed through its ranks. A record of the services of all officers and men is being compiled and will prove very interesting reading.

CAVALRY MAN WINS V.C.

Lieut. Harvey Was First Canadian To Do So.

For most conspicuous bravery and devotion to duty. During an attack by his regiment on a village a party of the enemy ran forward to a wire trench just in front of the village, and opened rapid rifle and machine gun fire, first at a very close range, causing heavy casualties in the leading troop.

At the critical moment when the enemy showed no intention whatever of retiring, and fire was still intense, Lieut. Harvey, who was in command of the leading troop, ran forward well ahead of his men, and dashed at the trench, still fully manned, jumped the wire, shot the machine gunner, and captured his gun.

His most courageous act undoubtedly had a decisive effect on the success of the operation.—Official Record.

In the general retreat of the Germans in the spring of 1917 the Canadian cavalry brigade was used to harass them in their departure from the Somme area. The Germans were fighting a rear defence action. The now famous Hindenburg line was their objective and in order to give themselves time to gain this position and consolidate themselves therein they maintained a strong outpost action in the rear. Villages were fortified and many of the best troops were left for their defence. The enemy seemed sometimes to lose his usual strategic balance and to change his mind peevishly. In March the brigade was ordered near Peronne, north of the Somme river, and when the retreat that the infantry were put to it to keep up with the Germans as they left their trenches and strong points, destroying everything as they went. Peronne was laid waste. Civilians were turned out of their homes in villages and the houses were burnt up. And yet the retreat continued. Only the cavalry could overtake the enemy with speed enough to hurry him as he left. In this the Royal Canadian Horse Artillery did splendid work. When the cavalry had driven it over to the infantry and continued the chase over hills and through woods, where frequently strong machine gun posts had to be dislodged.

March 27 saw the cavalry still in pursuit of the enemy. In the early part of the day several villages and fortified woods were reclaimed from the Hun and a counter-attack driven off. Then a snowstorm stopped proceedings for several hours. It was 5.15 o'clock in the afternoon before the air was clear enough for the horsemen to start out again.

The daylight was falling when the Lord Strathcona Horse reached the top of the hill overlooking Guyencourt. They found themselves faced by strongly held machine gun posts, and wheeling they galloped around to the northwest corner of the town. Lieut. Harvey was in command of the leading troop. Riding ahead of his men he was first to reach the outskirts of the town and found again that the Germans had entrenched a machine gun in front of the town and protected it with wire entanglements. Springing from his saddle, he ran at the post, firing his revolver at the same time. He leapt over the wire, shot the gunner and jumped on the gun. When his men came up he was in possession of the post. The troop entered the town. For clearing the way for his men the troop leader was awarded the Victoria Cross.

Lieut. Harvey was the first Canadian cavalry man to win the Victoria Cross in this war. Besides this, the highest award a soldier can win, Lieut. Harvey wears two other decorations, the Military Cross and the French Croix de Guerre. The French decoration was conferred on him for being the first to enter the village of Fontain, March 28, 1918, where he effected a connection with the French cavalry. It was at this time that the French, mistaking Harvey and his men for German spies dressed in British uniforms, had them arrested and held for several hours, releasing them with many apologies on identification by other British officers.

The Military Cross was won a few days later when by sheer gallantry the Canadian cavalry stemmed the advance of the Germans on Amiens.

Lieut. Harvey was farming and ranching near Macleod, Alta. when war broke out. In the spring of 1915 he joined the 13th Canadian Mounted Rifles as a private, receiving his commission before going overseas.

He was with his unit at the time of signing the armistice and just before going into Germany with the army of occupation went to England one day in a fog in an airplane to get the colors for his regiment, under which to march into the conquered country. The colors were presented by Lady Strathcona.
