WERE LEFT OFF THE ONTARIO ELECTION LISTS

And Were Unable to Vote On Monday—The G.W.V.A. Discussed the Question At Its Meeting.

Mrs. Graham Answers Mr. Bartels. Kingston, Oct. 20. (To the Editor),—In answer to Mr. Bartels' city treasurer's statement of Friday.

I wish to state that I have compared Mr. Bartels and the city engineer's figures very carefully, item by item, and find that there is a balance of \$1546.29 which, according to the engineer's figures, has not yet been accounted for by Mr. Bartels, the city treasurer.

The difference as above is \$1,546.39, which in my statement to Council, I stated he had accounted for that amount more than the engineer, but I should have stated that the treasurer's amount of inspection fees were \$1546.29 less than the engineer's. Now it is up to Mr. Bartels to show where the above amount has gone to.

REV. W. T. G. BROWN'S OPINION

On The Result of the Elections On Monday.

When interviewed Tuesday morning upon the result of the Ontario general elections Rev. W. T. G. Brown expressed his great satisfaction over the vote upon the referendum. Referring to the statements attributed to Sir William Hearst that his Government was defeated upon the temperance policy. Mr. Brown stated that he did not think this was so, because the O.T.A. was sustained while the Government candidates were defeated. Mr. Brown stated that the Government's defeat was due to the revolutionary spirit of the people which is shown by the tendency to support their own classes. This was the case with labor, soldiers and farmers. It might be true, though that Sir William Hearst was defeated upon the temperance issue but the turn-over was undoubtedly due to the revolutionary tendency to strike at the heads of the Government. Sir William Hearst was a personal friend of Mr. Brown, and he regretted his defeat very much.

ADDRESSED CUSTOMS MEN.

With Regard to the Re-classification of the Service.

On Friday evening, T. H. Burns, of Ottawa, secretary-treasurer of the Dominion Customs Association, paid a visit to the Kingston branch, and addressed the members on the various points of the work of re-classification of the whole service at large, the abolition of patronage appointments, promotion of merit, and many other matters of interest. The Dominion Association is now strongly organized from Atlantic to Pacific. Mr. Burns pointed out the benefits of permanent organization to secure further reforms. It would appear that the civil service in future will have some incentive for his efforts to look forward to and young men could now enter the service and receive promotion on merit and ability to perform the duties required. The government and the public will also benefit by a greatly improved service, the cost of which will be reduced by elimination of those whose usefulness is over, by a practical scheme of superannuation.

Returned Men Complain.

Late Monday afternoon it came to the attention of the local G. W. V. A. officials that a large percentage of returned men were unable to vote on the referendum. A strong protest was sent to Sir William Hearst regarding this, and another to the provincial secretary of the G. W. V. A. It is claimed by the veterans that the returned men were not allowed to get in their votes, as they were not registered. It seems that the enumerators in getting the returned men's names for referendum and the feeling among veterans is very strong.
