

**TO SPEED UP BIRTH RATE**

**PLEA FOR MOTHERHOOD OUT OF WEDLOCK AT CONFERENCE.**

To Remove Prejudice—What France is Doing in Providing Protection in Illegitimate Birth Cases.

New York, Oct. 22.—A plea for motherhood out of wedlock was made yesterday at the International Conference of Women Physicians by Dr. Anna Moutet of France.

"In a country the population of which is decreasing," she said, "it is important above all to favor the rate of birth by every means, to do away with all obstacles in the protection of all children indiscriminately.

"Motherhood outside of marriage must no longer be held as a disgrace or a burden. The girl mother must be lifted. The prejudice which makes her an object of general censure must be combated; and if irregular birth is no longer a disgrace to the child, neither must it be a dishonor to the mother.

"She must find society for herself and for her child the support which in the past was refused her."

Describing what France has done in this matter, Dr. Moutet said: "The law has assured the protection of the child born out of wedlock, first in creating a bond of right between him and his parents when that is possible; then in assisting the mother when she is alone and without resources, and, finally, in taking full responsibility in rearing the child."

"In 1917 the Government assisted 70,562 abandoned girls, mothers or wives and widows, in the support of their children. An allowance to the mother of 10 to 30 francs a month is made payable in advance until the child is three years old. In 1917, out of 3,330 children cared for by a Government Bureau, 2,603 were illegitimate."

"There is still room for great improvement, according to the speaker. "Laws regarding investigation of fatherhood are too lax," she said "and ought to be broadened, even if they should disturb the peace of a few families whose egotism and false honor are respected at the expense of the child. It is necessary to facilitate marriage and legitimation still more. Any measure will be good which will assure every child equal rights and an equal place in the world."

In a general discussion of sex morality and prostitution several speakers urged the necessity of more stringent police measures to cope with the evil.

**WHEN THE PREMIER'S SUPPORTERS QUIT HIM**

**He Recognized Defeat When Toronto Barrister Took Meeting by Storm.**

Toronto, Oct. 22.—The World says: One of the outstanding features of the campaign was the defeat of the prime minister, and probably Arthur W. Roebuck, the Toronto barrister, contributed more than anything else to bring this about. Up until a few days before the election Sir William Hearst's return was generally conceded, but a change in feeling followed which was as quick as it was inexplicable. This feeling, as a result of a meeting held at the Soo, Saturday, finally "piled into a rout," and how the premier's defeat was borne in on his supporters is best told by a prominent citizen of the Soo, who arrived in Toronto yesterday:

"When the Conservative meeting on Saturday night was in progress," he said, "the chairman announced that they would extend a hearing to an opposition speaker. Mr. Roebuck promptly mounted the platform and from that moment took the meeting away from the prime minister. He made a wonderfully telling address, and when he left the platform the crowd cheered and demanded that he continue speaking. The incident was probably unique in the political history of Ontario—a speaker taking away his opponent's own meeting. Mr. Roebuck's remarks on nickel were most effective and the prime minister did not even attempt to answer them."

**TWO ESCAPE FROM JAIL.**

Alfred O'Brien and Ralph McPherson Gain Liberty at Stratford.

Stratford, Oct. 21.—Alfred O'Brien, Stratford, and Ralph McPherson, Thorold, two youths aged 17 who escaped from the jail here Sunday afternoon, are still at large. The boys were awaiting trial for breaking into two stores at St. Mary's and for the theft of an auto at Georgetown. Five minutes after the boys were let out in the yard for exercise they had escaped.
