One million majority for the drys has already been piled up in the aggregate result of the voting on the four questions of the referendum on Monday. The following is an analysis of the returns up to 1 p.m. to-day and they are still coming in all with big majorities for "the No." Question 1, majority 280,758. Question 2, majority 231,379. Question 3, majority 253,557. Question 4, majority 172,121. These indicated that the final majorities against the return of liquor in any form, either over the bar or through Government dispensaries, would reach between 300,000 and 350,000.
