THE WORLD'S TIDINGS IN CONDENSED FORM

Tidings From All Over Told in a Pointed and Pithy Way.

Brantford factories have big orders on hand. Heavy snowfalls are reported over the prairie Provinces. Four wireless operators from the Louisbourg Station, N.S., are missing since Tuesday afternoon. All necessary preparations are being made, according to Rt. Hon. Bonar Law, for the trial of the former Kaiser.

James Simpson, Labor-U.F.O. candidate, may enter a protest regarding the manner in which the West York election was conducted. The Ontario Sunday School Association at its convention in Toronto Wednesday decided to alter the name of the body to the Ontario Religious Education Council. The Private Bill Committee of the Commons, on a vote of eight to seven, approved the Senate bill granting a divorce to Arthur L. Escoffier of Pembroke.

The Montreal civic delegation at Ottawa to protest against Montreal being deprived of \$25,000 taxes by reason of the Government acquiring the Grand Trunk, were told that there is no ground for their apprehension. Fredalin Leclerc, a returned soldier, tried to kill Anna Lepore, a former sweethearth, in a Montreal dance hall, but the cartridge failed to explode, and when he was pulling the weapon a third time he was overpowered.

ALMOST CENTENARIAN OUT TO RECORD VOTE

Mrs. M. J. Smith, of Collins Bay, Wanted to Vote for Prohibition.

Collins Bay, Oct. 22.—The returning officer of this polling subdivision received a great surprise on election day when Mrs. M. J. Smith, who is almost a centenarian, came forward and received her ballot on which to register her vote for prohibition, and also for her favorite candidate, Anthony M. Rankin. Mrs. Smith celebrated her 88th birthday on Oct. 18th and is still in possession of all her faculties. The many birthday gifts received by her testify to the esteem in which she is held by her friends who all trust she may be spared to reach the century mark.

MEN HAD BOTTLE ON STREET.

This is what Magistrate Farrell said to John Gifford, at Thursday morning's session of the police court, after His Worship had heard his story about meeting some men on the street and drinking out of a bottle. Gifford has been on the sick list, and he says this was the reason the liquor put him under. He was accustomed to drinking and felt sure that a few drinks would not knock him out.

The magistrate imposed a fine of \$10 and costs or one month. Michael McNally, on remand on a charge of being intoxicated, was also fined \$10 and costs, or one month.

The Ceremony At Queen's.

The ceremonies at Queen's will not take more than half an hour all told. The Prince will proceed to Convocation Hall, from the Senate Room with the academic procession. Principal Bruce Taylor will say a few words of welcome and will then present the Prince to Chancellor E. W. Beatty who will confer the degree. His Highness will reply and the procession will then leave the hall, the Prince walking with the Chancellor and the Principal.

Sentenced To Penitentiary.

The two gunners in the R.C.H.A., Lucien Lanson and Albert Reeves, who were sent up for trial by Magistrate Farrell, some weeks ago, were tried in the Criminal Court on Wednesday by Judge Lavill. They were charged with a very serious offence against a comrade, and were proved guilty. Both were sentenced to three years in the penitentiary.

Will Be A Market Saturday. On Thursday morning a number of market gardeners were endeavoring to find out whether or not there would be a market on Saturday, due to the Prince of Wales being in the city. Most farmers will come to market as usual.

THE DRY MAJORITY IS STILL GROWING

Vote In Favor of Prohibition Equal to the Famous "Three-Fifths."

Toronto, Oct. 23.—The last figures issued give the following result on the prohibition question for the whole province: Yes. No. Maj. 1st 223,874 508,809 284,955 2nd 245,502 479,511 235,709 3rd 275,193 493,887 258,694 4th 275,589 453,245 275,583

It will be seen from the above that on the first question the "dry" vote approaches seventy per cent. of the total vote, and that on question four it amounted to sixty per cent. of the total. The vote in favor of prohibition is thus equal to that formerly required to carry local option.

London, Oct. 23.—Resuming her testimony yesterday before a House of Lords committee which is conducting an inquiry into her dismissal as commandant of the Women's Royal Air Force, the Right Hon. Mrs. Douglas-Pennant, daughter of Sir John Pennant, declared that the South Carlton camp in Lincolnshire, where Americans were stationed, was among those where immorality existed. On one occasion, she added, the women's huts were raided during the course of the night, a drunken American officer climbing through a window and "creating a terrible disturbance."

AN ELECTION STORY OF THE TORONTO WORLD

It Alleges Orange Edict Went Forth to Beat Sir Adam Beck.

Toronto, Oct. 23.—"What happened in London" is the caption of an editorial which the Toronto World published yesterday giving the World's idea as to the forces which combined to beat Sir Adam Beck.

"Some people profess to think that the defeat of Sir Adam Beck at the polls in London was a mysterious and inexplicable affair," the World says. "The Hearst administration was out for Sir Adam's scalp."

"It had been fondly hoped that Premier Hearst and his band of helpers would come back with a following of 40 at least. The next important thing to be done was to cut Sir Adam Beck's political throat."

"If Sir Adam Beck could be defeated in London, and Sir William Hearst be strengthened in Queen's Park, the rest would be easy. So efforts were concentrated on London."

"The C.P.R. and G.T.R. workmen were instructed that they must work against and vote against Beck. An edict went forth from the Orange order in Toronto that Beck must be beaten. It will be remembered that Hon. W. D. McPherson, when asked, would he pledge himself to Beck, declined to do so on the ground that he was a member of the Government, a high official of the Orange order. On Thursday last the members met in London and agreed to carry out the commands."

"The Hearst administration has been cleaned out. There has been no material injury done to Hydro; Sir Adam Beck's policy has been sustained throughout the province, and he is ready to carry the radial plans, the Chippewa development, and the Lawrence installation to completion."

NOVA SCOTIA ORE FOR GREAT BRITAIN. The Steel and Coal Company Hopes to Resume Trade Overseas.

London, Oct. 23.—The Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company is making arrangements for the sale of iron ore to Britain and later the finished product. Thomas Cantley, who, with Messrs. Ross and McDougall, of the company, will be here for some weeks said the company sold iron here before the war, and they hoped to resume business. They will also visit the continent, and it is expected there will be a market there for rolling stock. Mr. Cantley denied that his presence in England had anything to do with a merger.

Discussion Next Wednesday.

(Canadian Press Despatch) London, Oct. 23.—The promised general discussion of financial questions in the House of Commons will take place on Wednesday of next week, it was announced in the House this afternoon by Bonar Law, Government leader.

The Supreme Council has decided to make an inquiry into a report that a German airplane with German and Turkish passengers has reached Koenigsberg, Lithuania.

The Czechoslovakian Government is considering the enactment of a law introducing total prohibition into Czechoslovakia.
