

The execution of the "Manchester Martyrs" in 1867, which caused considerable excitement in British circles over the possible overthrow of Britain's Irish control, was fostered by the Fenian Brotherhood, an Irish political institution initiated in the United States

An attack on Chester Castle, containing 20,000 stand of arms. was planned by branches of the Fenian Brotherhood. The British Govpoisoning, bad leg, piles, cuts, burns ernment was well informed on the proposed plans, and Col. Kelly and Capt. Deasey, the leaders, were captured by the Manchester police. The Fenians resolved on a rescue, and thirty strong Irishmen attacked the police van in which the prisoners were being conveyed to jail. In their attempt to release the captives the police officer was mortally wounded, and Kelly and Deasy, though handcuffed, escaped. For this deed, three Irishmen, Allen, Larkin and O'Brien, called the "Manchester Martyrs," were executed on November 23, 1867.

Irish national feeling was stirred to a high pitch during the uprising. and fully 150,000 attended the funeral of the "martyrs" at Dublin. The execution was made the subject of a poem later by Timothy D. Sullivan, entitled "God Save Ireland."




