## FORWARD MOVEMENT NEED

EXPLAINED TO THE CONGREGATIONALISTS OF KINGSTON

An Address on Friday Evening by Dr. E. T. Ritchie, Principal of the Congregational College, Montreal.

The members of the local Congregational churches met together on Friday evening at the First Church lecture hall to get the great Forward Movement under way. About two hundred sat down to supper and afterward listened to an inspiring speech made by Dr. E. T. Ritchie, D.D., Ph.D., the newly elected principal of the Congregational College in Montreal. Dr. Ritchie is just over from the Old Country, where the Professor, of Philosophy at Nottingham University, and he was sent to Canada to take over the principalship of the college in Montreal.

In explaining the need for a Forward Movement, Dr. Ritchie dwelt on the great need of a soul in a nation. A nation may have wealth, prosperity and good government, but without soul it could not exist. The awful state of the world today demanded a Forward Movement. He had all too good reason to know this awful state. In France and Belgium he had seen with his own eyes the awful horrors of war. France to-day is one vast desolation and a huge cemetery, ten million of the youth of the world lie there, killed that Right may rule over Might, that the epidemic of death be recognized, and that God might once more come into his own. These men knew what they were going into and they paid the price willingly. The people in Canada could not realize what Europe was in those days, many lost their nearest and dearest, and even then they could not, unless they had been there, know what a state the world had come to.

And so the churches of Canada were going to protect a Forward Movement to try and place the world on a footing that it will be fit to live in. But it could not be done without individual effort on everyone's part. All the churches were going into it no matter what race or creed. They had but one great idea, to bring the churches back to their one true supreme position in matters spiritual. He stated that we do not devote to reality, and as God is at the bottom of all reality we must get to God, we must build on things spiritual and make sure that Canada might not in vain have learnt through such a baptism of fire as it has, that after all the world needs a church, and that speedily. That Canada might play a great part in a new and better world. If the people could not see the need of a Forward Movement after what happened over there then they must be made to, and the church must be the medium of showing it. If at the churches got together and worked for this great end, Dr. Ritchie said that the Congregational church would be very much in the van. The only way to prevent another war is "the power that the church has, the fellowship of faithful men and women. And so Dr. Ritchie concluded, we must all get together, first to do our part individually, by making ourselves better, and then seeking to help others who found the process less easy.

### WHISKEY FOR CANADA

It Was Trilled for Miles and Seized Near Syracuse.

Syracuse, N.Y., Oct. 25.—A motor truck loaded with 100 cases of whiskey, thought to have been smuggled into the state from Canada, valued at \$6,000, was seized by the sheriff of Onondaga county yesterday was intended to break the drought in Syracuse, was trilled for more than twenty miles by the sheriff's party and was not seized until shots had been fired to compel the driver of the truck to halt. The driver denied knowledge of where the whiskey was to have been delivered.

### Professional Hockey a Certainty.

Quietly and unobtrusively plans are being perfected for a professional hockey league. The N.H.L. according to Montreal information will operate on a broader basis than ever this year. Quebec and Toronto, it is stated are almost certainties for the league, and it is likely that the Wanderers will be revived. There has never been such a pentitude of material as this season. Whole teams have been released from war service and are being sought by the probable clubs. Conference between Ted Day of Ottawa, George Kennedy of Montreal, President Calder and Toronto club owners have been held recently and tentative plans which will be amplified later were discussed.

### Inland Revenue Receipts.

Ottawa, Oct. 25.—Receipts of the Inland Revenue Department for September amounted to \$4,636,314, an increase of over half a million dollars as compared with September, 1918, when they totalled \$4,039,690. Collections for war purposes totalled \$1,254,767 a considerable increase over September last.
