South African war; three thousand of her sons and daughters served in the great world war, many having paid the supreme sacrifice; 71,000 troops were sent out from this Military district to defend the integrity of the British Empire.

To His Royal Highness Edward Albert Christian George Andrew Patrick David, Prince of Wales, Earl of Chester, Duke of Cornwall, K.C., G.C.M.G., M.C.:

Kicked Off Ball.

After the inspection of the veterans, who were lined up in front of the pavilion, a way was made through the crowd to the football field, where the Prince kicked off the ball for an exhibition match between two veterans' teams as arranged by J. R. Forster, patron of the Football League. The players were highly honored and the Prince spoke to the two team captains, wishing them good luck.

After the ceremonies were over, the veterans were dismissed and the Prince's party, accompanied by the mayor and Major-General Williams, returned to the Royal Military College, taking Barrie street to Princess, down Princess to Ontario, thence to the R.M.C. The La Salle causeway was beautifully decorated for the occasion.

At The Royal Military College.

At the Royal Military College the Prince was received by Major-General Macdonell, commandant of the college, who introduced the members of his staff. The cadet battalion received His Royal Highness with the royal salute, and was then inspected. Following the inspection the ceremony of presenting the colors was performed. Dean Starr, chaplain to the college, performed the religious part by blessing them and the Prince presented them. A tour of inspection of the buildings was then made and when this was completed the royal party had lunch with the commandant and his staff. After lunch His Royal Highness witnessed a gymnastic exhibition and at 3 p.m. he is to leave the college for the golf links at Portmouth, where he is to play a game and meet the members of the club.

At Queen's University.

This evening, at 6.30, the degree of doctor of laws will be conferred on the Prince at a special convocation in Grant Hall. Before the ceremony Principal Bruce Taylor will introduce the deans of the various faculties to the Prince in the red room. Chancellor Beatty will be present for the occasion, and will accompany His Royal Highness in the academic procession.

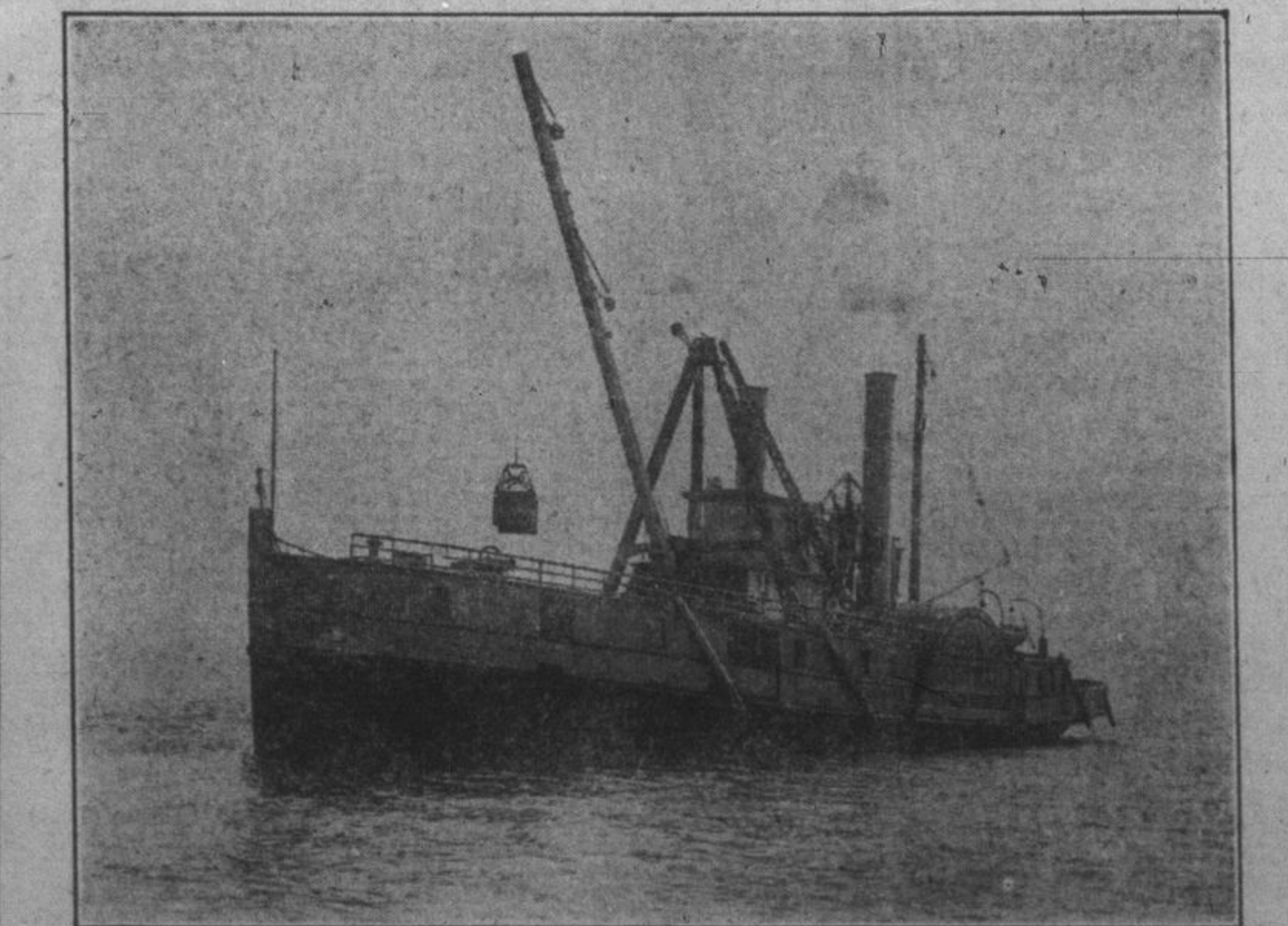

## Steamer That Carried Prince In 1860



The steamer Cornwall, of the Donnelly Wrecking Company, is the old steamer Kingston, on which King Edward VII. (then Prince of Wales), came up the St. Lawrence river to Kingston on in 1860, and afterwards went on to Toronto.

The steamer is one of the best equipped salvage tugs on the great lakes and the St. Lawrence river. She is a steel steamer with four-inch elm bottom outside the steel hull.

The Cornwall is a familiar figure in the Kingston harbor and at Ports-

mouth, where she is given a berth when not in working and is always in readiness to go at a moment's notice to any vessel requiring assistance night or day.

The following are some interesting points regarding this historic steamer:

Length, 176 feet; beam, 27 feet; depth, 10 feet. Beam condensing engine; diameter of cylinder, 45 inches; length of stroke, 30 feet; indicated horse-power, 400. Speed, 14 miles per hour; draft, 8 1/2 feet, and is adapted for both lake and river services. She carries 350 tons

of lighterage, and has the following wrecking equipment on board ship at all times: Thirty-ton steel derrick forward. This is fitted with 1 1/2 yard clamshell outfit for lighterage purposes. A ten-ton derrick aft. Four 12-inch rotary steam pumps; 5 and 4-inch gasoline pumps. Two 6-inch, one 4-inch, one 3-inch syphons, with steam connections and steam hose for steam pumps. Three 11-inch wrecking hawsers, diving outfit, air compressors, with full outfit of lumber and canvas for patching purpose; also accommodation for large wrecking crew.
