JOHNSON AMENDMENT HAS BEEN REJECTED

Washington, Oct. 27.—The Johnson amendment to the peace treaty, proposing in effect, that the voting power of the United States in the League of Nations be increased to equal that of Great Britain and her dominions, was rejected today by the Senate. The vote was 38 for the amendment and 40 against it.

AT GRANT HALL TO-NIGHT.

Fine Programme To Be Given Under Auspices of the Navy League. A very fine programme has been arranged for the concert, which is to be given at Grant Hall to-night, under the auspices of the Navy League. His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, is patron of the Navy League. The artists for this programme include Charlotte Bergh of Chicago, coloratura-soprano, probably the finest singer who has appeared in Kingston in many years; Edna Wheeler, Ballad Harpist, one of the greatest harpists of the United States; Tracey Jay Kingman, baritone, who has appeared in all the principal cities of Europe and has sung before royalty.

Some Veterans Feel Hurt. Some of the men in Spidham Hospital are complaining because they were not permitted to go out to see the Prince of Wales on Saturday. One man stated to the Whig that his uniform was taken from him on being admitted to the hospital and he was given a suit of blue hospital clothes. On Saturday all the patients who were able to be out of bed were allowed out, with the exception of those in blue. They feel quite hurt because they were denied the privilege of joining in the veterans' parade.

Pleased With Arrangements. Inspector Chamberlain, of the Dominion police, was in the city on Saturday. He has been making the tour with His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales. He was more than pleased with the arrangements made here for the reception to the Prince of Wales, and remarked that the arrangements were carried out in such a manner as to reflect great credit on all in charge.

Three men lost their lives in a storm on St. Lawrence River hardly five miles from Quebec Harbor Saturday, a fourth was rescued in an unconscious condition after being lashed to a mast of a vessel for an entire night.

WILL SEE THAT PEOPLE OBTAIN SUPPLY OF COAL

Washington, Oct. 27.—The whole country waited expectantly to-day for the miners' answer to President Wilson's blunt command that the soft coal strike ordered for Saturday be called off. There was not a word, however, to show where the United Mine Workers of America stood. While there was no assurance that the President's letter would bring peace to the coal fields, there seemed to be no doubt of the Government's determination to see that the people obtained an adequate coal supply to keep them from suffering and permit the nation's vast industries to continue operation.

BACK TO THE WALL

Difficult to Get G. T. R. and Temperance Bills Through. Ottawa, Oct. 27.—Apostles of the middle way in politics, of compromise, are beginning to find the way of Union Government no rosier one. On the war the two component elements of Union Government could unite on a common ground, but on peace-time problems counsels are almost hopelessly divided. The situation has led almost inevitably to a policy of stalling and side-stepping. Courageous action was possible only when their back was against the wall as in the Grand Trunk Railway deal, or when Sir Thomas White's resignation forced the appointment of a successor in Sir Henry Drayton.

The Government's back is again against the wall. The Senate is expected to give strong opposition to the Grand Trunk Bill, and it is whispered that the Government's only sure way to get it passed is to promise a saw-off by dropping the amendments to the Doherty Bill and the Canada Temperance Act.

It is well known that many Conservative members of Parliament are feeling sore and cranky over the whole prohibition question, attributing to it the defeat of the Ontario Government. Their attitude says plainly: "The temperance says will vote for you on account of passing this legislation. They did not for Hebert. Therefore why pass it?"

Hamilton Milk Should be Cheap. Hamilton, Oct. 27.—The Fair Price Committee has recommended to the Board of Commerce that the price fixed \$3.10 per eight-gallon can of milk, be not made applicable to those supplying milk to the city of Hamilton. This price was tentatively fixed in Toronto pending a complete investigation into the cost of production and delivery of milk to the city of Toronto and the distribution thereof. It was ascertained from evidence submitted there that milk had to be supplied at a distance of 150 miles, whereas the supply for Hamilton was secured within a radius of 10 miles. The present rise in milk to the producer is caused by increased cost of shorts, bran and concentrates necessary for the feeding of cows during the winter months.

Grenville U. F. O. Wants Recount

Brockville, Oct. 27.—The political atmosphere in Grenville County is as yet somewhat mixed, United Farmers are not satisfied with the official declaration giving Hon. G. Howard Ferguson a substantial majority over G. Alfred Payne, and have asked for a recount of ballots, which has been granted by Judge Dowseley on application of Police Magistrate Halpin, of Prescott, acting for the defeated candidate. The recount will take place here some day next week. It is reported that some 259 ballots were received by the different deputy returning officers over the constituency as unmarked for either candidate. The U.F.O. also allege that irregularities occurred in connection with the making of returns. The outcome will be watched with interest.

Edward Bayly, K.C., Made Deputy. Toronto, Oct. 27.—Edward Bayly, K.C., for the past twelve years solicitor to the Attorney-General's Department, has been appointed Deputy Attorney-General, succeeding the late J. R. Cartwright, K.C. Mr. Bayly's appointment was made by order-in-Council on October 8th, but was not announced until Saturday. At the same time the announcement was made of the appointment as solicitor of A. N. Middleton, for several years legal secretary to the Department.

A Wedding Anniversary.

Odessa, Oct. 27.—On Saturday evening, Oct. 18th, a very pleasant evening was spent at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Charles H. Parrott, when they celebrated their twentieth wedding anniversary. Seventy-four guests were present. The decorations were of the national colors. Much fun was created by the table vivandé party, which was held immediately after the supper. The esteem in which Mr. and Mrs. Parrott are held was shown by the many presents received.

General Booth Coming.

London, Oct. 27.—General Booth, of the Salvation Army, makes a prolonged tour in Canada early in the new year, after visiting the United States.

On Friday morning a solemn anniversary requiem mass was sung in St. Mary's cathedral by Rev. Father Hanley for the late William H. Hartman, who died Oct. 24th, 1918.
