KINGSTON IS AWAY BEHIND F. G. WALLACE IS RETIRING

IN ITS SUBSCRIPTIONS TO THE VICTORY LOAN.

This City Must Not Fail to Win Prince of Wales Flag—Frontenac Is Behind Peterboro County.

All stores and industrial establishments employing twenty-five or less are entitled to an honor emblem when seventy-five per cent of employees subscribe and ten per cent of the annual pay roll. Who will be first in Kingston?

Speakers on the Victory Loan will be in Harrowsmith and Sydenham Sunday night.

Thomas Mills' team led in the amount of subscriptions brought in Wednesday and Mr. Mills brought in the largest amount.

Portland township is leading Loughboro township. It will be interesting to see which of these townships wins the Prince of Wales flag first. Their objectives are \$75,000 and \$70,000 respectively.

In the race with Peterboro county, Frontenac is away behind, Peterboro having a percentage of 8.71 against our percentage of 2.51.

It would be a calamity if Kingston did not win the Prince of Wales flag just after his recent visit here. Some weeks ago at Ottawa the Prince expressed the hope that every city and district would win his flag.

MR. AND MRS. HARRY CARD REMEMBERED BY FRIENDS.

On Occasion of Their Leaving Wolfe Island to Take Up Residence in Kingston—Mr. Card Has Been Worthy and Trusted Servant at Island for Many Years.

A very happy event took place on Wednesday evening at the home of Harry Card, Wolfe Island, when a large and representative party of the citizens of the island visited his home in a body to mark the occasion of his moving from the island and taking up his abode in Kingston. Mr. and Mrs. Card were taken completely by surprise.

Mrs. Frank Cramer read an address to Mrs. Card on behalf of the Ladies' Aid of the Methodist church, expressing the regard and esteem in which she is held by the members of that organization. Mrs. Cooper then presented a beautiful plex case with silver lining encasement.

Mrs. Card, who was deeply moved, made a suitable reply. Rev. Mr. Doherty then read an address signed by Revs. Father Fleming and T. Leech, Misses Workman and Doherty on behalf of the citizens. Expressing a deep sense of the loss sustained by the community in as much as Mr. Card in his business as general livery and conveying passengers to and fro from the island to the city had proven himself an efficient, worthy and trusted public servant.

No Action Yet Taken.

A former officer stated today that not in thirty years had such a proceeding occurred at the institution. The prisoner it is said, was complaining of his treatment and threatening to get even.

And Will Return to Pittsburg, Pa.—His Successor Has Not Yet Been Appointed.

F. G. Wallace, President and managing director of the Canadian Locomotive Company, has resigned and will return to his former home in Pittsburg, Pa.

When interviewed on Thursday Mr. Wallace confirmed the report that he was leaving, but said that he

It is not known yet who will be Mr. Wallace's successor. He expects to remain for the next month.

Napanee Man Summoned.

On Thursday morning Justice of the Peace George Hunter received word from Toronto that the car answering to the number which ran over William Lowry, of Westbrooke, belonged to Frederick Burt, R.M.D. No. 1, Napanee. As soon as this word was received Mr. Burt was notified that he was to appear before the court on Nov. 3rd, to answer to the charge, committing a breach of the Motor Vehicle Act by knocking down William Lowry and causing actual bodily harm.

Call To Martintown.

Rev. John Murray, of Kingston, who graduated at Queen's Theological College, last spring, and was licensed to preach, has been tendered a unanimous call to the pastorate of the Presbyterian church at Martintown. The stipend is \$1,700 and a manse. Mr. Murray has accepted the call and will be inducted early in November. He was editor of Queen's University Journal last session.
