### A BIG CRIST OF BUSINESS

FOR DISCUSSION AT ASSOCIATED BOARDS OF TRADE

Kingston Will Ask for a Bonus to the Steel Shipbuilding Industry — Twenty-four Resolutions Have Been Entered.

At the meeting of the Ontario Associated Boards of Trade, which will be held at Toronto on Nov. 20th and 21st, twenty-four resolutions will be dealt with. Belleville sponsors six. No. 1 asks the Ontario and Dominion governments to publish an up-to-date report upon the minerals and metals of the province, their distribution, quantity and equality, especially with regard to iron, the foundation of Canada's basic industries. No. 2, an annual appropriation of taxes on departmental stores, mail order houses and public utilities. No. 3 asks for a reduction of railway freight and express rates on coal, wood and food products; also that all rates on business and commercial telegraphs and cables be fixed as low as possible. No. 4 asks for the adoption of an Empire trade mark; also that the immigration of British citizens between Great Britain and the overseas dominions be possible, subsidized in any way and, if possible, subsidized. No. 5, calls for a publicity campaign for the development of Ontario agriculture and industries. No. 6 asks the Provincial and Dominion governments to encourage by subsidy or otherwise, aviation for commercial and postal purposes.

The city of Brantford asks for a tax on foreign magazines and the construction of a highway between Hamilton and Brantford. Goderich asks for the appointment of a royal commission to study the tariff. Ganong asks for a uniform customs declaration for all goods requiring customs declaration, on goods shipped anywhere in the Empire. Hamilton will move a resolution on fire prevention. Kingston asks for a bonus to the steel shipbuilding industry, endorses the Ontario Government's highway scheme and uniform rates for Hydro power. Kitchener proposes a plan for greater production and the electrification of the G. T. R. Niagara Falls asks that all property owned by governments, municipalities or commissioners be taxed just as private property. Port Arthur asks aid for steel plants and the erection of a blast furnace at Port Arthur, costing \$15,000,000, as planned four years ago. A number of amendments to the Mining Act are proposed; also a government bonus of fifty cents per ton of iron ore for ten years. St. Catharines proposes that the year 1920 be declared a year of industrial peace during which there shall be no strikes or lockouts, but that all questions between employee and employer be adjusted. Toronto asks for an investigation with a view to taxing net, instead of gross, income. It also endorses the adoption of the Canadianization policy and urges the appointment of local Canadianization committees. Daylight saving is advocated as a beneficial Dominion-wide measure.

The Kingston representatives will be Elmer Davis, J. M. Campbell and J. G. Elliott.

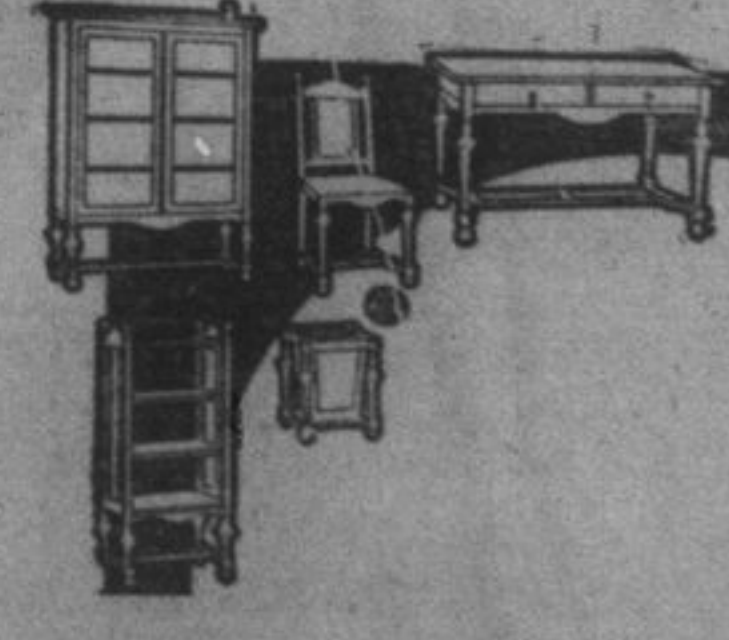
