AN INNOVATION OF VALUE

HAS JUST BEEN INTRODUCED INTO THE AUTOMOBILE WORLD.

The Establishment of an Agency for the Maxotire in Kingston Will Enable Car Owners to Obtain Maximum Wear From Tire Casings.

An innovation of great value in the automobile world has just been introduced to Canada by the establishment of an agency for the Maxotire in Kingston. The Maxotire is an inner casing, made of three-ply rubber and fabric, and it is designed to enable car owners to obtain the maximum wear from tire casings. The Maxotire which is produced at a large plant in Delaware, Ohio, is designed to fit inside the outer casing, and it encloses the inner tube so that it cannot blow out. In fact, tires which are equipped with the Maxotire may well be called trouble-proof and puncture-proof. This innovation is recognized by those who have tried it to be the best thing yet invented for the wearing out of old casings which would otherwise be sold to the junk dealer.

Albert Neale, of the Standard Vulcanizing Company, who is the sole agent for Canada so far, says that he himself has used Maxotires in old casings bought from the junk dealer. He showed a Whip representing the casing which he had bought for thirty cents, and on which he ran 1,600 miles after it had been equipped with a Maxotire. R. J. Grant, of the R. J. Grant and Sons Rubber Company, bought four of these inner casings for his own use, and he was so impressed by their value that he became an agent for them, and has just ordered his fourteenth car load. One valuable feature is that the Maxotire can be used in an number of outer casings successively, it being so simple to transfer it from one casing to another. Some samples of how it stands the pressure when placed in an outer casing containing a large number of holes, are shown at the premises at 284 Ontario street, where the Maxotire agency is situated. ORPHANS' HOME ANNUAL

THIS INSTITUTION IS IN SPLENDID RUNNING ORDER.

Report Presented Friday Afternoon—Addresses by Mayor Newman and Others—Obedience the Theme of the Addresses.

The annual meeting of the Board of Directors of the Orphans' Home was held Friday afternoon at the home. A large number of interested friends of the home were present. The chairman was Mayor H. W. Newman, who opened the meeting with a few words of advice to the children. He urged on them obedience to their teachers, and that only by obedience could the work of bringing them up to be good citizens, be accomplished.

The next item on the programme was the reading of the reports. First came the report of the home committee, read by Mrs. H. D. Bibby, secretary. It outlined the work of the home during the last year, and thanked those who have done so much for the home during the hard years of war. Great credit was given to Miss MacKenzie, the superintendent, and it was felt that her influence over the children was very beneficial. There are 60 in the home, 34 girls and 26 boys. Sixteen attend the Victoria and Sydenham schools and the rest are taught in the home by Mrs. Gansby. It was necessary to hold a tag day and \$98.88 was realized. The bequest from the late Mrs. R. Waldron amounted to \$800, and this was used for repairs to the buildings. Special mention was made of the splendid work done by Dr. E. C. McCallum during the epidemic, and also to those who volunteered their services to help out the home when all the children were sick. The report concluded with an appeal to the people of the city to help by personal visits or advice.

The registrar's report was then read and shows a total number of inmates admitted during the year to be 122, and the number discharged 69. Average stay was 136 days. Inmates received from Kingston were 100; from Frontenac, 16; Province of Ontario, 6. The financial report showed the receipts to be \$9,657.44, and disbursements \$9,687.56. The deficit was \$30.14, and Mayor Newman in summing up stated that this reflected great credit upon the excellent management of the Board of Directors.

An excellent programme of songs was rendered by the children during the afternoon, and their rendition of "God Bless the Prince of Wales" was warmly applauded.

Rev. J. O. Crisp, Rev. J. Tannahill and Rev. S. LaFlair spoke on obedience and habits in the children's upbringing, and in story-form illustrated the great benefits to be derived from explicit obedience.

Miss MacKenzie, the superintendent, spoke on the importance of influence in the children's upbringing. Influences which are varied, but they are always one of two great classes, either those that lift or those that lower, and it was the work of the staff to lift the children toward a righteous citizenship.

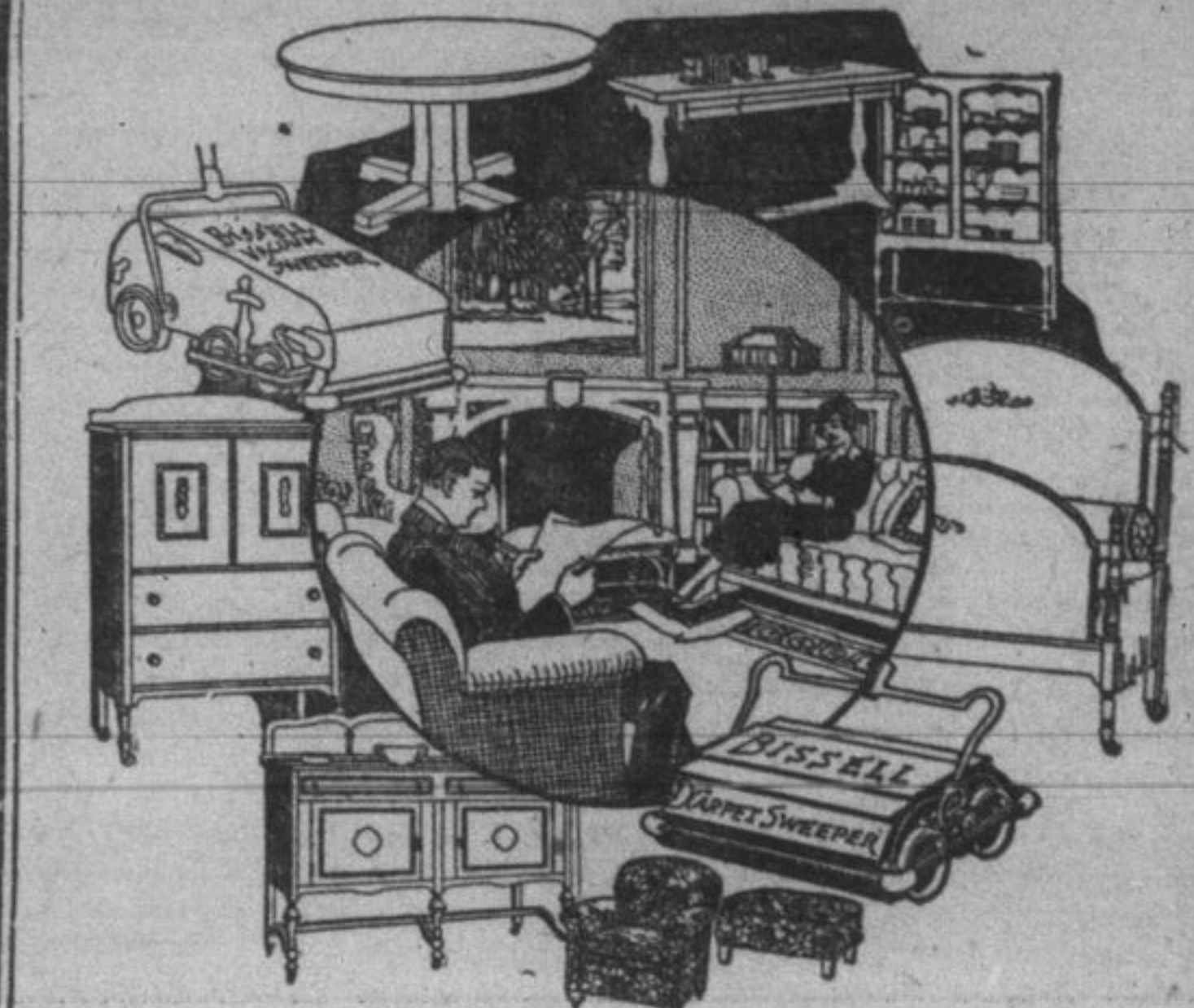
