The consecration of St. James' Church on Friday.

Cushendall, Nov. 1.-The consecration of St. James' church, Pittsburgh, by Bishop Bidwell, took place on Tuesday last, Oct. 28th, in the presence of a fairly large congregation. Besides the bishop there were present the rector, Rev. W. J. Gratton, Rev. Dean Starr, of Kingston; Rev. J. D. Crisp, of Portsmouth, and Rural Dean A. O. Cooke, rector of Barrfield, and Rev. J. W. Jones, secretary of the diocese. In spite of the fact that the morning was stormy a goodly number of people attended and listened attentively to a very helpful discourse by the bishop. Mr. Gratton presided at the organ. After the service all present sat down to a very substantial luncheon provided by members of the congregation, to which tribute was paid afterward in a very hearty manner by the visiting clergy.
