TO BUY VICTORY BONDS WHILE THEY MAY

It is Time That the Small Investors in Kingston Woke Up to the Great Opportunity Offered Them.

A meeting of the council of the Board of Trade was called on Monday afternoon to meet members of the Victory Loan Committee, but there was not a quorum present. Mr. Mulholland, local organizer informed those present that the absence of the chairman of the Loan committee, was a great handicap and requested the co-operation of the Board in the work. He stated that the same time last year there were 755 subscribers and a total sum of \$851,000, as compared with 299 subscribers and \$238,000 at the present time. He thought there was no good reason for such a difference, and that more publicity should be employed to get the Loan before the smaller investors. It was a fact that up to the present the Loan appeared to be being grabbed by the big investor and firms that could utilize surplus cash for the purpose. They recognized that this might possibly be the last Government Loan with so good an interest as 5 1/2 per cent. and they were taking all they possibly could. The small investor was not getting his share and this was a cause for regret. A proposal had been made to have speakers give a five-minute address in the theatres on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays, and he asked the Board to help obtain suitable speakers for the next two weeks. A list of speakers had been proposed and a committee was appointed to interview the parties and report. Reports from other districts showed that the loan is making very satisfactory headway. The people will wake up after the bonds have all been bought up and have but themselves to blame for failure to grasp a good thing when it was within reach. This statement was made by a prominent business man at the close of the meeting.

On Friday evening, a mass meeting will be held in the City Hall at which Brig-Gen. Ross will preside. The chief speaker will be Col. C. O. Williams, late chief recruiting officer for Canada. The R.C.H.A. band will be present, and a splendid concert will be given.

RETIREES AFTER FORTY YEARS IN SERVICE

Lieut.-Col. C. E. Long, R.C.A., One of Best Known Canadian Officers.

Lieut.-Col. C. E. Long, R.C.A., acting director of artillery at Ottawa, has retired from the service. He has been a long and creditable record both in war and in peace, and he enjoys the popularity and esteem of soldiers from one end of Canada to the other. He served in three wars—North-West, the South African war and the great conflict in Europe, where he was gassed. He worked hard during the many years of peace in which he was connected with the permanent force where his efficient efforts and kindly manner have won friends with all he has met.

Lieut.-Col. Long retired after having served forty years in the Canadian militia, thirty-six years of which he served in the Royal Canadian Artillery. For years he resided in Kingston. He joined the First Prince of Wales Rifles, Montreal, June, 1879; "A" Battery, R.C.A., 14th June, 1883. He served in the north-west campaign, 1885, as N.C.O. in charge of No. 2 gun, "A" Battery, R.C.A. (Fish Creek and Batoche). He also served in South Africa in the R. C. F. A., during 1900. Colonel Long joined the Canadian contingent on 8th of August, 1914 and served two years with the artillery of the Canadian Division in France and Belgium. He was appointed Acting Director of Artillery 1st of April, 1917, and has held that position since then to date. The gallant colonel wears the North-west medal ribbon, the South African and the 1914 and the other ribbons for the last war. Col. Long is the father of Mrs. Howard Marshall, Colborne street.
