

WILLIAM CASEY IN CHARGE

OF THE CANADIAN LOCOMOTIVE COMPANY MANAGEMENT

President F. G. Wallace Given Six Months Leave of Absence By Board of Directors at Meeting in Toronto.

F. G. Wallace, president of the Canadian Locomotive Company has definitely decided to relinquish office as the active administrative head of the Company in Kingston. Last week he tendered his resignation and at a meeting of the directors in Toronto on Tuesday morning the situation created by his action was seriously considered.

The Board unanimously insisted on Mr. Wallace retaining office, but granted him six months leave of absence, which is tantamount to acquiescence in his request to be relieved of the work.

William Casey, general manager, assumes charge of the Company's affairs. In an interview to day the following statement was handed out:

"A meeting of the directors of the Canadian Locomotive Company was held in Toronto today, for the purpose of taking action upon the resignation tendered by F. G. Wallace, president of the Company."

EXTRA G.T.R. TRACKMEN HAVE BEEN LAID OFF

Much Work Done in Past Season Between Montreal and Belleville.

Brookville, Nov. 4.—With the exception of one or two extra track gangs completing repair work on the Grand Trunk main line, all extra trackmen between Montreal and Belleville were laid off yesterday at the end of the season's work. Between fifteen hundred and two thousand men were engaged in this work during the summer, with the result that the line was considerably improved. New ties and steel were laid, together with trainload after trainload of ballast. The work was in charge of Supervisors of Track Frank Griffin and W. Bibby of Brookville.

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OBITUARY

The Late Mrs. Redden. A very sad death occurred on Tuesday morning when Mrs. Eva Redden passed away at the General Hospital. Deceased had been sick a long time and was removed to

hospital a few days ago. Mrs. Redden is survived by four children, a brother in Gananogue, and two sisters in the States. Deceased's husband was killed overseas. The remains will be sent to Gananogue on Wednesday for interment.

She belonged to McDonald's Corners and had been in the General Hospital some little time. Deceased was born at Mississippi and was a clerk by profession and single. Her parents are dead. The Late Mrs. Wiseman. The death occurred early Tuesday morning of Margaret Wiseman, aged seventy-nine years. Deceased was only ill a short time, and succumbed to pneumonia. She broke her hip some years ago and had been ailing since. Deceased was the widow of Francis Wiseman, who predeceased her by some three months. Born in Ireland, the late Mrs. Wiseman came to this country and lived here ever since. She is survived by one son, J. A. Wiseman, of 71 Stephen street. The funeral will take place on Thursday morning and the remains will be taken to Odessa for interment.

MACHINE GUN BRIGADE

Will Have a Kingston Company—Registration Next Week. The work of organizing the machine gun brigade is proceeding. The headquarters of the brigade will be located at Kingston, and there will be a Kingston company. Each company will have eleven officers, fifteen staff-sergeants and sergeants, a total of 127 rank and file. The brigade headquarters will consist of five officers, two warrant officers and two staff sergeants. Capt. John Edwards, late of the 11st Battalion, C.E.F., is acting adjutant, and will conduct a registration next week. His office at the armories will be open every evening from 8 to 9.30 p.m., as well as during the day time, in order that returned men and others may join the machine brigade. Lieut.-Col. P. G. C. Campbell has been appointed officer commanding the brigade and the personnel of the staff is under consideration. It is pointed out that there will be the inevitable waiting list for both officers and men. Some very proficient men have already applied, and from the experienced men available the brigade will be one of the best.
