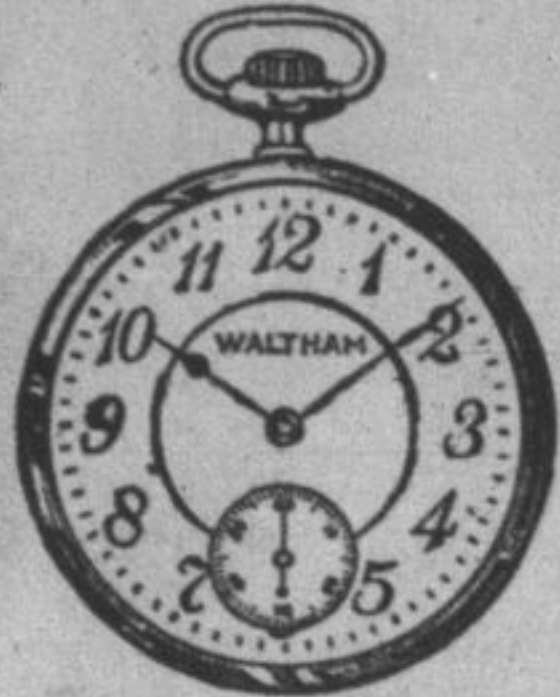

THE HUMOR OF THE SCOT

AN ADDRESS GIVEN BY PRINCIPAL BRUCE TAYLOR

Before the Kingston Teachers Association Thursday Evening "The Humor of the Scot."

The opening meeting of the Kingston Teachers Association took place in the lecture room of the Physics Building of Queen's Thursday night. There must have been well over 100 teachers of the youth of Kingston gathered to hear Principal Bruce Taylor talk on "The Humor of the Scot." There are two phases of humor, the comic, and the real humor. Dr. Taylor said: "The comic is that which makes you laugh at a fox terrier running after his tail. The watcher knows well that the dog will never catch his tail, and therefore the incongruity of the situation appears comic. Humor is void of emotion and contains an element of the unexpected. People don't laugh at the expected, at old stories. They know the point in them, therefore they do not laugh. Humor, whilst it has the same effect as the comic, in that it makes one laugh, is vastly different in many things.

Dr. Taylor, then cited the case of the late Duke of Norfolk, who was undoubtedly the worst dresser in England. He went to see over a lunatic asylum, and whilst there he was stopped by one of the inmates, who asked him who he was, and the Duke of Norfolk told him, "Ah," said the lunatic, "You should be here too. That is humor, which is in some persons to a great extent, not always strongly evident, but emerging just when the occasion arises. A good humorist is invariably clever, and he finds in his humor a certain reading of life. There seems to be a great deal of misapprehension as to the difference in humor between the Scot and the Englishman. The humor of the Englishman is in reality, wit, while the Scot, who is supposed to lack humor, have it, but it is slower in appearing.

The speaker then touched upon the difference in Scotch and English, Scotch and American humor, and whilst the English humor lies in rapid wit, the American lies in his adaptability to exaggerate. Principal Taylor described the land of his birth and the people, their customs etc. He told of the old parish headie, the schoolmaster, both of whose supremacy in their villages, lay in their freedom from outside influences. He intermingled his lecture, with excellent stories etc. and in concluding stated that behind all the fun of Scotland lay a desire for real simplicity, a passion for education, that had turned out some wonderful scholars, but in spite of all, the Scotch had a great belief in the things unseen and eternal.

SUDDEN DEATH OF ARNPRIOR FIRE CHIEF

M. J. Rafter, Able Fire Fighter, Was Stricken With Heart Trouble.

Arnprior, Nov. 7.—Fire Chief Martin J. Rafter died at his home Tuesday night. The chief's death was very sudden, heart disease being the cause. During the day he was at his work in his blacksmith shop and in the evening, after having eaten supper, was in his usual good health. At midnight he complained to his wife that he was choking, and she reached his side he was breathing his last.

The late chief Rafter was appointed to the head of the fire department about twelve months ago. He was an able fire-fighter and enjoyed the confidence of all citizens. The deceased was in his thirty-fifth year. He is survived by his widow and three small children.

An "Oily Rectory."

Government experts are said to have solved the mystery of the "oily rectory" of Swanton, Nov. 7, 1919. The theory which was hit on early in his harassing experiences by the rector, Rev. Hugh Guy, is correct—the house is built over, or around, a genuine oil well, and the experts are of opinion that the thirty-fifth year double-fronted Victorian villa in its own grounds—will have to be pulled down, because if the oil were bored for from the outside it might easily be missed. A corollary theory that the oil evaporated and condensed on the ceiling is supported by the men of science. The experts advance no opinion with regard to the length of yield when the oil well is struck. A former resident says that the rectory was only remarkable in his occupancy for its dampness, fungi growing in the lower rooms to the height of several feet.

The Orkney Islands.

The Orkney Islands do not really belong to Great Britain in the sense that they were ever ceded by treaty or acquired by conquest. They were simply transferred by Denmark to Scotland in 1468 in pledge for the payment of the dowry of the princess Margaret, who was married to James III, King of Scotland. In the deed of transfer, which is still in existence, it is specially mentioned that Denmark shall have the right to redeem them at any future time by paying the original amount of the dowry with interest to date. There is no likelihood, however, that Denmark will ever attempt to exercise her right of redemption, because 10,000 foras, the original amount of the dowry, would amount to perhaps a trillion of pounds sterling—that is a bit more than the lands are worth.

"Grog."

A long program clerk that the British admiral, Edward Vernon, says wore on deck during "dirty weather" is said to be responsible to be named "grog," the sailor's designation. The admiral's men irreverently called him "Old Grog," and "grog" was the name they gave the rum and water he served them aboard ship.

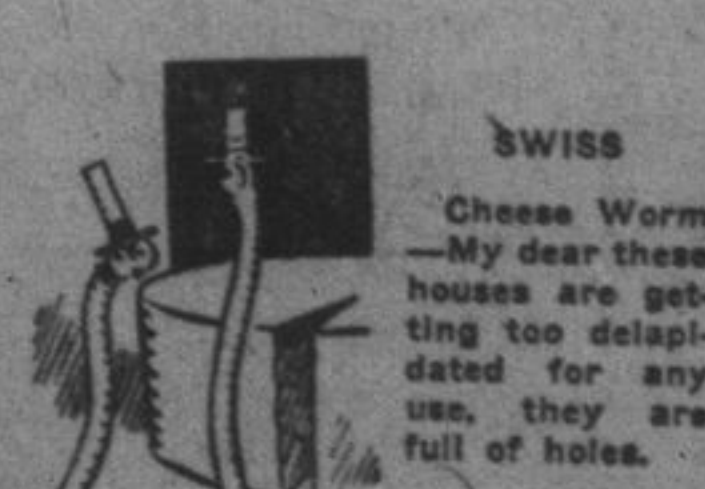

THE WORLD'S TIDINGS IN CONDENSED FORM

Tidings From All Over Told in a Pithy Way.

British, American and Italian interests plan construction of large shipyards in Peru.

When President Poincare and Madame Poincare visit England on Nov. 19 for a four days' sojourn they will be the guests of the King and Queen at Buckingham Palace.

A motion to dissolve the order restraining officials of the United Mine workers from directing the strike was filed in the United States court at Indianapolis, Ind., Thursday. The petition will be heard Saturday.

The congregation of Old St. Andrew's Presbyterian church, Toronto, decided to extend a call to Rev. William Muir Auld, of Calvary Presbyterian church, Philadelphia. The stipend to be paid him was fixed at \$5,000 per year, with two months' holidays.

The special committee of the Toronto Board of Education appointed to decide upon a business manager to supervise the administrative departments of the board unanimously chose City Architect William W. Pearce to fill the position. The salary will be \$5,000.

Edwin W. Sims, president of the Chicago Crime Commission, declares that Chicago with its population of 3,000,000 has more murders in a year than England, Scotland and Wales, with their 49,000,000 people. Last year the murders in Chicago averaged one a day.
