QUEEN'S FEEL QUITE COCKY

THINK THEY MAY BE ABLE TO DEFEAT MCGILL

In the Game in Montreal on Saturday—"Nack" Williams Is Taking a Goodly Number of Players Down.

It is very hard to prophesy the result of the Queen's game with McGill on Saturday at Montreal. One great thing in Queen's favor is the fact that several of McGill's best men are laid up in hospital. Ambridge, inside wing, had his shoulder put out badly when he was here last time, and again by Varsity last week he hurt his arm when he missed a tackle. Flannigan is likely out for the season, whilst Montgomery, the quarter, is on the sick list.

On the other hand, the tricolor have the most of their men in good shape, although two or three of their regulars are not liable to be playing. Bowman, the big inside wing, had his shoulder put out in the last game, and he is still nursing it, whilst Carson and Young are not to be on the playing list this Saturday. "Jack" Williams is still confident that his fourteen can play McGill a close game, and he is keeping his men at it tooth and nail. Queen's team are shaping up pretty well at practice, and are becoming more sure in both catching and tackling. Frode and Elliott are now well into the swing of things, and are doing very good work. The team is determined to make a stab for one game at least and their chances to do it are good. If the weather is good, Queen's are all right, but the slippery ground seems to unnervise them and they go down a number of good spares, so, no matter how many of his men McGill knocks out, there will be some more to carry on. Queen's team will, in all probability, line up:

Brownfield, flying wing; Carroll, McKelvey and Campbell, halves; Evans, quarter; Sills, Ferguson and Ellis, scrummers; Brandon and Frede, inside wings; Elliott and Abernethy, middle wings; McIntyre and Vanalstyne, outside wings; Stewart, Carruthers, Harris, McNeill, Nickle and Morris, spares.

The officials for the game have not yet been decided and "Jack" Williams is expecting a call to take one along with him.

SYSTEM ENGLAND'S SECRET IN ROWING

The secret of success attained by English crews in international competitions, the latest of which took place in the Royal Henley Peace Regatta last July, followed by the intercollegiate regatta later in the same month in connection with the "spiralized" games, is that there are no secrets among leading English oarsmen. This was the opinion of Major Paul Withington, former Harvard all-around athlete, who coached the American team at Henley and Paris and represented the United States in the single sculls.

"The absence of the professional coach in English rowing as the American knows him makes of rowing in the British Isle an open book," said Major Withington. "The schoolboy in England, much earlier than the boy in the United States, is taught to row. He is taught the universal English system."

Yale football followers are elated over the news that Neville, Lay, Kirkpatrick and Capt. Callahan are fit and ready to take their places in the Eli line-up.

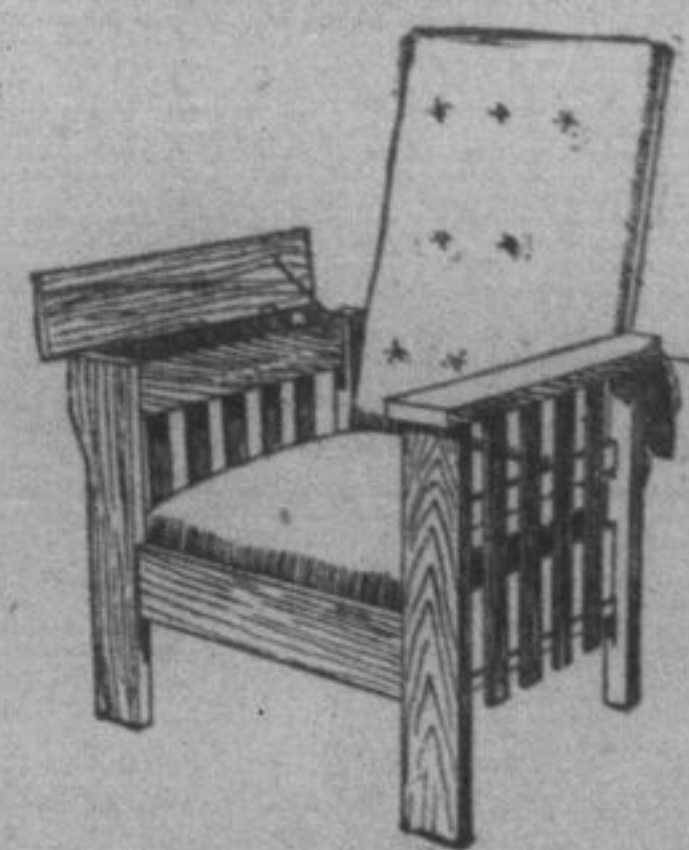
"Kid" Elberfeld, the former scrappy big league pastime, who managed the Little Rock Club last season, has blossomed out as a light manager with two boxers in his stable.
