Canada's Real Rival.

For the first time, so far as present recollection goes, the press of Buffalo has been so realistic that, in so far as grain transportation is concerned, the Dominion of Canada, has become a formidable rival of the United States.

The News, in giving the view of State Superintendent of Public Works Edward S. Walsh on the Esch-Pomerehne bill, now pending in Congress, as it affects the Erie Barge canal, quotes him as saying that in its present form the bill would involve Federal control of the barge canal system and the fixing of through freight rates, thus seriously impairing the enormous investment the state has made for waterways.

It further quotes Mr. Walsh as telling the House Committee on Interstate Commerce:

"Place your carriers plying the all-water route from the head of the Great Lakes to seaboard, via the New York canal, subject to regulation so that their rates are rigid and inflexible and what will be the result? The Canadian lines to Montreal will be unregulated and uncontrolled. Grain will follow a route offering the smallest fraction of a cent per bushel saving, and there can be no doubt but that the Canadian carriers, being free to make any rate sufficient to attract the business, will offer this saving."

According to the News it would not be long before the evil effects of this bill would be felt by Buffalo. It declares that the elevator in that city would fall into disuse, "because commerce would be directed to the Canadian water route, and Montreal would grow and prosper at the expense of Buffalo." While this is true, it is not all of the result for such an outcome would also result in the commerce of New York City, which disposes of the grain of Troy, with a deepened Upper Hudson channel, taking its place among the tidewater ports. It is also pointed out that the Canadian Government is too wise to impose any measure of control that would embarrass wholesale competition.—Rochester Democrat and Chronicle.

Forecasting the "Flu." With a view to combating effectively the next outbreak of influenza, scientists and doctors have been investigating the causes of epidemics, says Answara.

They have proved that influenza travels in waves, which recur at remarkably coincident times all over the world.

The 1918 epidemic started in China. After this the wave spread to the Pacific coast; in the American soldiers' concentration camps. It then passed across the Middle West, and Chicago was badly attacked in March, 1918. Thence it passed to Europe, and laid low 16,000 of our sailors at Scapa Flow. France received the disease later, and the tail-end of the wave was on the Italian front.

Spring, summer and autumn waves of influenza have been experienced in this country, where it is expected to make a reappearance at a period now being worked out by experts. When further records have been made, it may be possible for these epidemics to be timed as fixedly as astronomical observations.
