Mr. Connolly is one of Cornwall's best known citizens, and has been a resident of the town for many years. 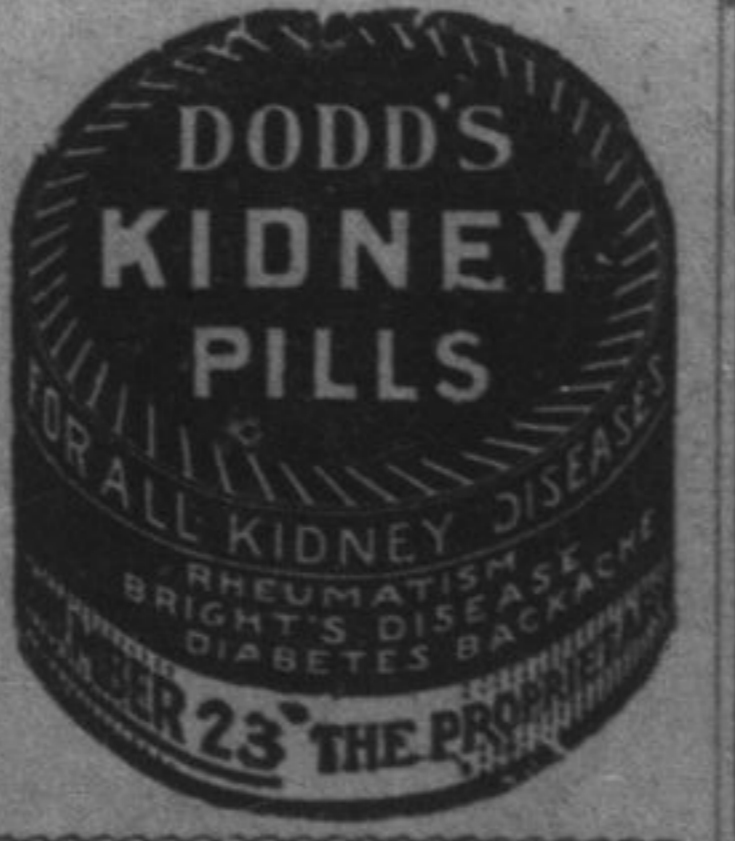
That Mr. and Mrs. Connolly may be spared to celebrate many more wedding anniversaries is the sincere wish of their many friends throughout this district.

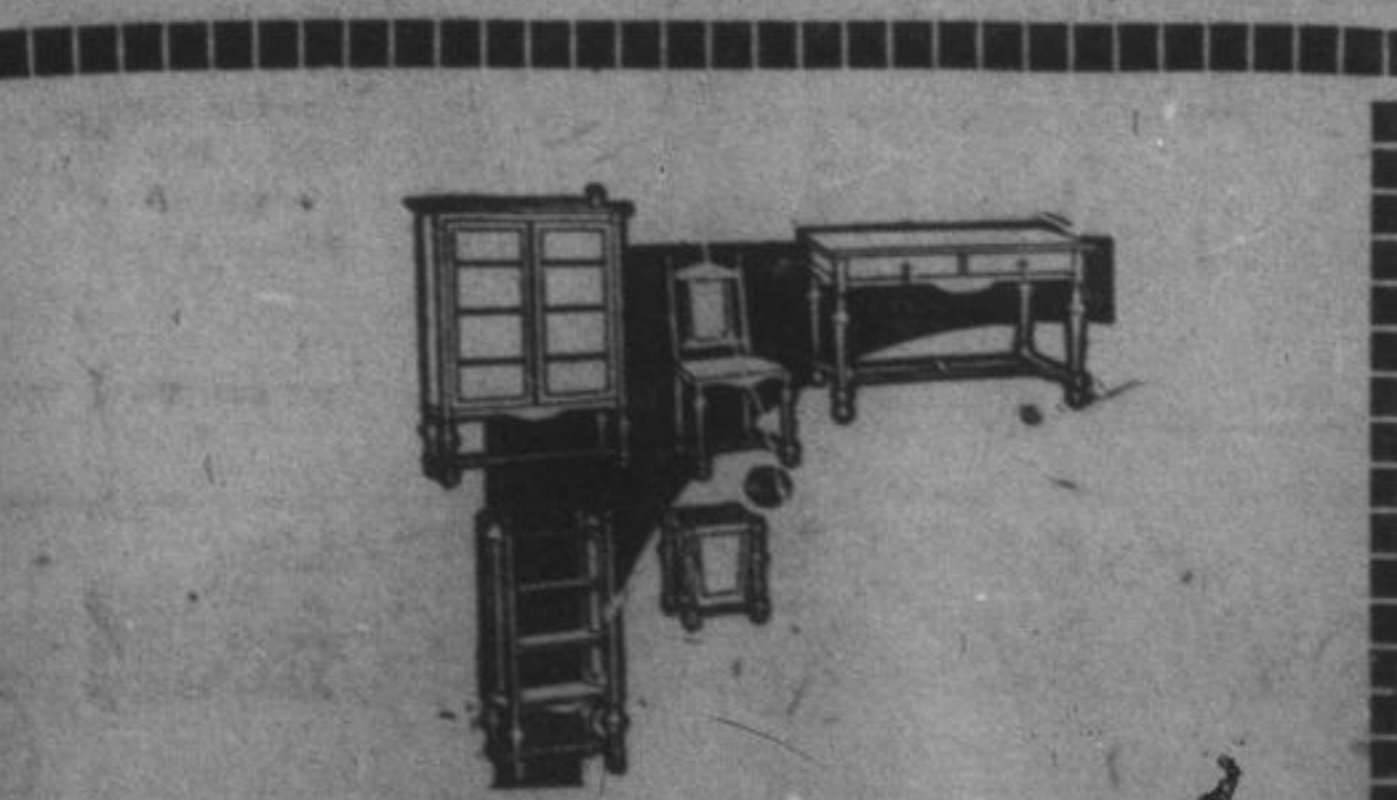
