Annual Sermon in St. Andrew's Church on the 30th—To Sell Heather in Aid of Hospitals.

The seventy-ninth annual meeting of the St. Andrew's Society of Kingston was held in the city council chamber on Friday evening. The financial report of the year was enthusiastically received, there being a cash balance of \$49.01 on hand and \$350 invested in Victory Bonds. During the year assistance was given to two families in need.

A letter was received from Sir Harry Lauder thanking the society for its contribution to his fund in aid of limbless soldiers and sailors. A letter was also read from Major-General Sir A. C. Macdonnell, K. C. M. G., requesting life membership in the society. The meeting unanimously decided to admit him to life membership. Three other new members were elected.

The officers for the ensuing year were elected as follows: President, J. F. MacMillan; 1st vice-president, H. D. Bankier; 2nd vice-president, H. V. Welch; sec-treas., J. Stewart; chaplain, Principal R. Bruce Taylor; bard, Lieut.-Col. McPhail; piper, W. A. Fraser; physician, Brig.-Gen. A. E. Ross; auditor, J. McL. Stephen (all re-elected); committee, W. G. Craig, D. Murray, J. E. Gow, N. Mansie, G. B. Fyffe.

It was decided to resume the annual St. Andrew's dinner this year, and the executive committee was instructed to make arrangements for the event to be held on Friday, November 28th, probably in the Frontenac Club. Arrangements were also made for the annual church service of the society to be held in St. Andrew's church on Sunday, November 30th, the sermon to be delivered by Principal Taylor. The society is to conduct their usual sale of heather on Saturday, November 29th, the proceeds to be divided evenly between the Kingston General and Hotel Dieu Hospitals. Supplies of heather received from Scotland were acknowledged.

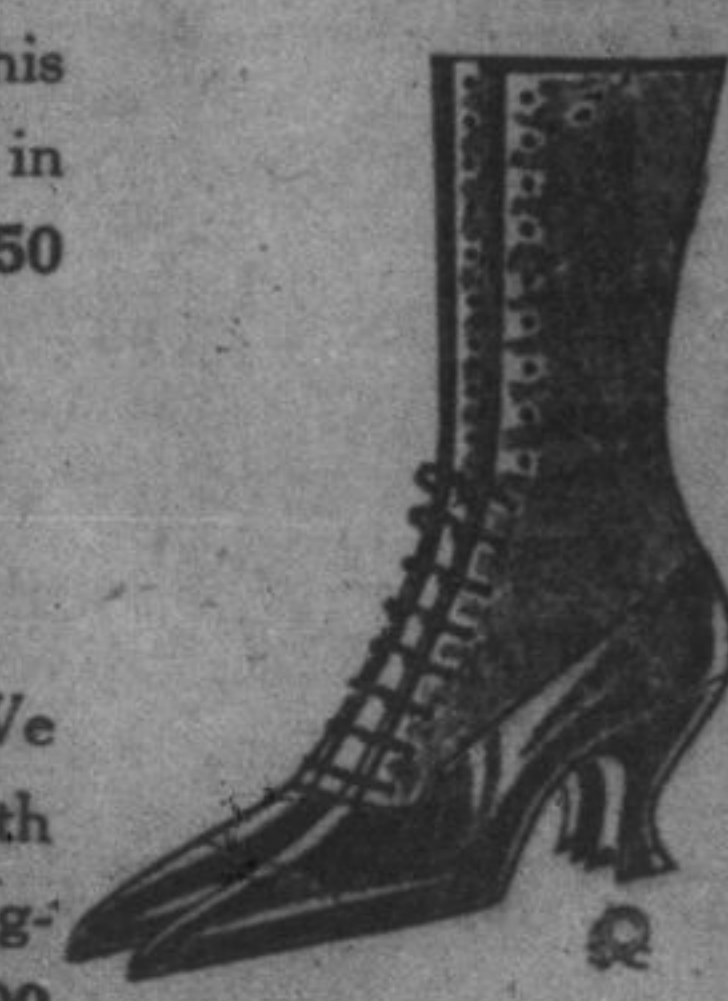
