HOSPITAL WORK IN FRANCE

BRIGADIER-GEN. A. E. ROSS ADDRESSED WOMEN'S CANADIAN CLUB

Large Audience Listened to Interesting Address in Convocation Hall on Friday Night—Inoculation a Great Thing During the War.

Brigadier-General A. E. Ross gave a very interesting address on "Hospital Work in France" before the Women's Canadian Club, in Convocation Hall on Friday evening. Mrs. W. F. Nickle presided, and there was a good turnout of the members of the club and a goodly number of outsiders.

General Ross spoke of the Canadian General Hospital and Queen's Hospital. The latter hospital, he said, had treated more cases for the time it had been stationed in France than any other hospital, and the speaker took occasion to pay tribute to the work of Col. F. Etherington, who was in command of this hospital.

General Ross also spoke about the various diseases and the methods adopted in fighting each, and told how inoculation had been a great thing during the war. He could not understand how any person could be opposed to inoculation.

The address was listened to with keen interest throughout, and at the close the speaker was tendered a hearty vote of thanks.

The meeting marked the first to be held by the club during the fall and winter season, and the members are delighted with the event.

WOUNDED SOLDIER KILLED

In Motor Car Accident—Driver is Under Arrest.

Toronto, Nov. 15.—Pte. George Sims died Thursday evening in the Christie Street Military Hospital from injuries he received when a motor ambulance in which he, with seven other crippled veterans, were being conveyed from Davisville, overturned on Christie street, near Tyrrell avenue.

Thomas Hitchcock, G.A.S.C., the driver of the car, is under arrest. The Army and Navy Veterans' Association are attending to the funeral arrangements for the Kingston unit, of which Sims was a member. For two years before the war he was a member of the 21st Militia Regiment, Windsor, Ont. He enlisted with the 24th Battalion in 1917, and on arrival in England was transferred to the 15th Reinforcement Battalion, and after three years' service in France lost a leg there. His widow is residing in Owen Stevens, Washington County, U.S.A.

IN MARINE CIRCLES

Movements of Vessels Reported Along the Harbor.

The steamer Buena Vista loaded freight and cleared for Seely's Bay. The vessel unloaded a cargo of apples here she brought from Trenton.

The steamers Outland and Joyland arrived in port from Montreal, and will be laid up here for the winter. The Outland had a lively encounter on her last trip on the lake, and on arrival was sunk in about fifteen feet of water, but it is expected there will be no difficulty in having her raised. The steamer Ionic, which was sunk in the Morrisburg Canal, is being brought to Kingston to-day under her own steam.

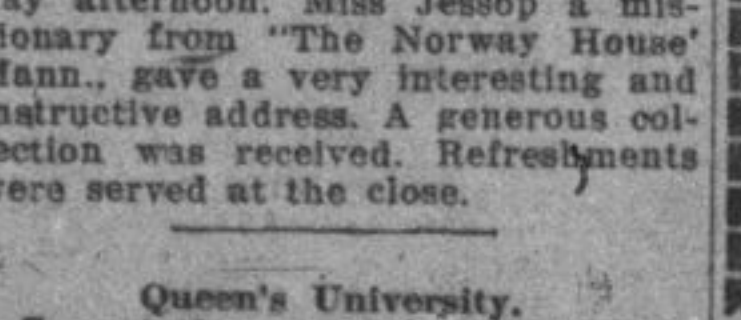
