PREPARED TO RESIGN.

Ontario Soldiers' Aid Commission Meets in Toronto.

Toronto, Nov. 15.—Members of the Soldiers' Aid Commission, at their regular meeting here today decided to communicate with E. C. Drury as soon as he assumes office as Premier, and advise him they were prepared to resign at once, or to continue in office until he decided as to the policy of the government.

Hon. W. D. McPherson, former Provincial Secretary, is chairman of the commission, and the other members present today were Senator Gordon, William Banks, K. W. McKay, R. J. Christie and W. F. Nickle, K.C.

A sub-committee was appointed by the commission today to investigate the number of orphan soldiers' children in Ontario and to take whatever steps may be necessary to properly care for them. It is possible that homes will be opened for them in London and Ottawa and Northern Ontario, although the intention is to ultimately place them in foster homes under rigid supervision.

Reports showed that during the last three months 391 men out of 1,294 had been placed in employment; that 19,297 men had taken the vocational classes; and that 3,333 are still enrolled; that up to the end of October, 102,800 soldiers had been returned to Ontario and registered with the commission, and that \$402,000 had been advanced to soldiers to tide them over difficulties.

Girl Will Recover From Poison. Detroit, Mich., Nov. 15.—Reta Brown, the nineteen-year-old Dundas, Ontario, girl who swallowed poison with suicidal intent because she had been reproved by an older sister, for late hours, will probably recover.
