Kingston Wins Again.

The electors of Kingston allowed General Ross to be returned by acclamation to accept a position in the Hearst cabinet but Oct. 21st put an end to his brief term of office. Now Premier Drury comes along and selects W. F. Nickle as attorney-general."

The Attorney-Generalship.

The Toronto Globe remarks: There will be general regret on the part of lovers of good government that W. F. Nickle did not see his way clear to accept the position of attorney-general in Ontario's new administration. His record of public service and his knowledge of parliamentary and legislative procedure specially fitted him for the post proffered to him by the coming premier, and the generous share of public confidence which he enjoys would have stood the government in good stead.

Banker's Elect New President.

At the annual meeting of the Canadian Bankers' Association, held in Montreal, E. L. Pesse, managing director of the Royal Bank of Canada, retired from the presidency. He had filled the position for the past three years. C. A. Bogart, Toronto, general manager of the Dominion Bank, was elected to succeed him.

The new President was born at Napanee, Ont., in 1864, and is a son of Ven. Archdeacon Bogart. He entered the service of the Dominion Bank in 1881, and, rising through various positions, became general manager in 1906.

Lieut. McCullough of Gananoque Lieut. J. Rodney McCullough, formerly of the 15th Battalion, has returned to his home in Gananoque where he is the guest of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. C. McCullough.

Lieut. McCullough, who was agent at Brockville, for the Canadian Pacific Railway, joined the 15th Battalion and went overseas with that unit. On the disruption of the Fifth division in England, he was transferred to the 2nd Battalion in France, where he was wounded last year. On recovery he assumed duty at a Canadian camp in England, where he has since been located.

There is quite a lot of turning in the middle of blocks on streets with double tracks, and as this is against the law, people are liable to get some damage bills to pay.
