Hitherto a clerk and a book have been in most departments the recording angel for the unpunctualities of those who arrived late. It is claimed by stern disciplinarians in the service that a good natured clerk could and does turn his blind eye to tardy arrivals, or else a benevolent eye to the clock. It has not been unknown for people who left their bomes at 9 o'clock never to arrive later than 9 at the office, so for as the record shows.

The Public Works Department is to find out how much time clocks cost, and if the cost is not too great all Federal employees will, in course of time, punch a clock as does any ordinary civilian in railway offices or factory employ.


