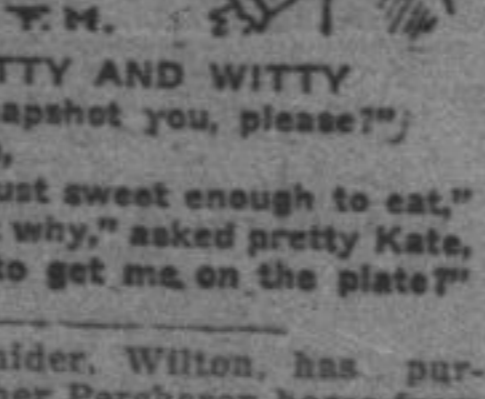

The Berlin metal workers have ended their strike. British casualties in the battle of Jutland were 6,014 killed and 647 wounded.

M. Masaryk, President of the Czechoslovak Republic, has countermanded the Peace Treaty. While crossing the Russo-Finnish frontier, Prof. Baron Nolde was shot by a Finnish sentinel.

Two thousand shop assistants have gone on strike at Cairo for 24 hours, alleging breach of contract. Poulet, the French aviator, has arrived at Bushero and resumed his flight to Kano.

Frederick Hanson, found guilty of manslaughter at Toronto, was sentenced to penitentiary for twelve years.

Five small flags signed by the Big Four fetched \$3,350 francs at the auction sale for infantile charities in Paris.

A strike of metal workers has been declared at several great industrial centres in Czechoslovakia, notably at Pilsen. Steamers on the Seine, which have been idle on account of coal shortage, have resumed sailing, using petrol and oil.

The German national debt next year apart from indebtedness under the Peace Treaty will amount to more than \$50,000,000,000.

Lieut. Madolesta, the Italian airman, flew from Stockholm to Helsinki a distance of 440 kilometers, in two hours and twenty minutes.

The death of Mrs. Elizabeth Nichols, widow of the late Thomas Nichols, and mother of Sir Thomas White, occurred in Toronto on Wednesday.

A Vienna telegram says that the Government has decided to refuse Bavaria's application for the extradition of Max Lovien, leader of the short-lived Communist regime in Munich.

The sailing ship Wolbert, on her way from Fecamp to England, was cut in two by a Swedish steamer. Two of the crew of twelve, were rescued. The fate of the remainder is unknown.

Premier Drury stated that Lieut. Col. D. Carmichael, D.S.O., will be appointed to the vacancy on the provincial Hydro-Electric Commission created by the death of W. K. McNaught.

In the elections in upper Silesia, in the Hindenburg district, 64 per cent. of the voters voted for the Poles. In the Beuthen region the Poles obtained 78 per cent. In the Tarnowitz region the Poles received 59 per cent.

Aerial services with large airplanes from six to eight passengers, have been established from Munich to Berlin via Nuremberg and Leipzig, from Munich to Frankfurt-am-Main and from Munich to Vienna.

MAY INSTALL CLOCKS

To Check Up the Civil Servants at Ottawa.

Ottawa, Nov. 15.—Civil servants are all agog over an order in Council just passed, approving the principle of using time clocks to mark the time of arrival at work.

Hitherto a clerk and a book have been in most departments as the recording angel for the unpunctualities of those who arrived late. It is claimed by stern disciplinarians in the service that a good natured clerk could and does turn his blind eye to tardy arrivals or else benevolently to the clock, it has not been unknown for people who left their homes at 9 o'clock never to arrive later than 9 at the office so far as the record shows.

The Public Works Department is to find out how much the clocks cost, and if the cost is not too great all Federal employees will, in course of time, punch a clock as does any ordinary civilian in railway offices or factory employ.

'Cupid's Advertiser' Raided. New York, Nov. 15.—Assistant District Attorney Kilroe last Sunday raided the New Hope Society, publisher of Matrimonial News and Cupid's Advertiser. Today he announced that he had raided the rooms of the organization and seized documents, books and many photographs.

Kilroe said he was informed upon joining the society that on payment of \$10 he would receive 'special attention,' and that if he paid \$25 he would 'get a millionaire for a wife.' It was necessary to join the society before inserting an advertisement in the papers, he said he was told.

Having assimilated this information Kilroe subpoenaed the publisher of the papers. The publisher did not appear, Kilroe said, and the raid followed.

Farmers Will Start Paper. Toronto, Nov. 15.—It is said that a movement is on foot by the farmers to start a paper in New Brunswick and to co-operate the new paper with the Farmers' Sun of Ontario, and the Grain Growers' Guide of the west. The idea is said to be to link up the three newspaper organs of the farmers of the Dominion for advertising purposes, while each paper will maintain an editorial independence in connection with the scheme it is said the Farmers' Sun and the New Brunswick paper will be modelled on the Grain Growers' Guide and published in magazine form.

Plague in Constantinople. Geneva, Nov. 15.—The International Red Cross received a telegram from Constantinople, dated November 3, stating that a plague had broken out in the Turkish capital, and asking for help. The Red Cross officials immediately took steps to rush serum to the Red Cross tent (the Turkish Red Cross) to fight the disease.

IN DANGER OF FUEL FAMINE

Natural Gas Supply Showing Signs of Exhaustion.

Windsor, Nov. 15.—This city and neighboring border municipalities tonight were face to face with a fuel famine as the result of the natural gas supply showing signs of exhaustion. The pressure in some sections on the east side of the city was so low that gas for heating purposes was practically useless.

The first touch of the season bears out the warning of the Gas Company officials that the supply was no longer reliable for heating purposes. The pressure at Tilbury wells has been steadily decreasing for the past year, and conditions are likely to be much worse than last winter, when, during the extreme cold weather, householders in some instances had to tear down fences to provide themselves with fuel.
