Sir: As the Kingston branch of this Association contains within its membership a very large percentage of returned soldiers resident in the County which you represent in the House of Commons, your attitude towards the question of re-establishment as reported in the press, was fully discussed in general meeting of this branch on Monday, 10th inst., and I was instructed to inform you that we are greatly surprised with the attitude you have seen fit to take on this question, and we feel that it is only fair to yourself that you should be informed that under present conditions you have entirely lost the confidence of the returned soldier citizen portion of your constituency.

We would request, Sir, that if possible, you may favor us with a full explanation of your attitude, as it appears to us most unsatisfactory that such a large number of returned men should be represented in Federal Government by one in whom they have little, if any, faith.

## SPECIAL COUNCIL MEETING

### TO CONSIDER THE NEW PUBLIC SCHOOL BY-LAW.

There May Be Opposition by Aldermen and the Matter May Be Referred to Vote of the People.

A special meeting of the City Council has been called for this evening to consider the request of the Board of Education for the passing of a by-law to raise by debentures \$142,000 for the erection of a new public school. The new tenders show an increase of over \$8,000 since early last summer, whereas the aldermen thought they were going to get lower figures. The delay in awarding the tenders last summer means that the new school could not be ready next year. Next year's council is, therefore, money in pocket, but the "evil day" has only been put off, as the new school has to be erected some time. It is expected that there will be some opposition by aldermen to the by-law, and the result may be the submission of the measure to the people at the January elections.

According to the public school inspector, the school population has increased during the past year. The city assessor's statement for 1919 shows the following children of school age (eight to fourteen) in Kingston: Public school, 1,752; separate school, 445. These figures show a drop in school population of 105 since 1918, but they do not show the whole school population, as some hundreds of children under eight and over fourteen attend school.
