

The honor of possessing the national Cinderella was jointly claimed to-day by Chicago, San Francisco and Atlanta. Inquiry among shoe dealers in many principal cities revealed that the average woman of those three communities possesses the smallest feet in the country-size 4 1/2 Atlanta dealers said their sales were about equally divided among the intermediate sizes from 116 to 516. In Ohicago and San Francisco the average size was definitely fixed at 416. It was indicated that St. Paul
