SENDS CITY \$145 CHEQUE

FOR CITY MATERIAL USED IN BUILDING HOUSE

Ald. Graham Tenders Payment, But the City Auditor Has No Check on the Materials.

On Thursday, the city treasurer received a cheque for \$145 from Alderman C. J. Graham, administrator of streets, for city materials used by him on his own private work. The treasurer turned the cheque over to the auditor, but the auditor knows nothing of the items covered by the cheque and will very likely turn the cheque over to the finance committee.

Any accounts in connection with the matter should have been rendered through the city engineer. From what can be learned, the fact of the matter is that Ald. Graham when he took over the city concrete mixer for his work on Princess street, also took what materials he required, or ordered the city's employees whom he engaged on his work to do so, and the value has been fixed by him or them, at \$145. This is apart from the use of the machinery, being stone taken from the city's crusher at the fair grounds.

ST. GEORGE'S MISSION HALL

Opened and Dedicated By the Bishop of Ontario.

On Tuesday evening St. George's mission hall, lately erected on the corner of Montreal and Cataract streets (opposite the Home for the Aged), was opened and dedicated by the Bishop of Ontario. Part of the Cathedral choir, vested, attended, while Charles Dalton acted as organist, so that the music was all that could be desired. One of the lessons was read by Rural Dean Crisp, the other by the priest-year of the cathedral who also presided.

The Bishop in a most happily worded address referred to the work in the first mission on James street and to its revival within the last three years in a very humble way in a shop on Montreal street. He spoke most hopefully with regard to the future, feeling sure that the new building would prove to be a social as well as a religious centre in this part of the city. The hall was crowded and the offering amounted to over \$54.

The purpose of the building is to provide a place for instruction of children in Sunday School, for Divine worship on week days for the time being, for a social club for men and such other social and religious gatherings as may seem expedient. Being in dimensions fifty feet by twenty-five it will provide ample accommodation for all purposes, while the interior, which is finished in beaver board kalsomined in two colors, with its low walls, open timber work, and casement windows is sufficiently attractive to make everyone who comes feel at home. Particular attention has been paid to lighting and heating so that the gatherings will be entirely comfortable. As half the total cost of the building is in hand, it is expected that very shortly it will be entirely free of debt.

RHODES SCHOLARS RULES

Scholars Will Be Chosen by Board Not by University.
Students who are ambitious to become Rhodes Scholars are reminded that applications for scholarships available next autumn must be in the hands of the secretary of the selection committee on or before November 25. The secretary is G. S. Stairs, Royal Trust Chambers, Montreal, from whom application forms may be obtained.

The trustees for the world famous Rhodes Scholarships at Oxford University have announced that a change in the system of election has been made, and that hereafter the scholarships, instead of being at the disposal of the different universities and colleges by rotation, will be thrown open to competition in each province. Committees of selection have been appointed, composed, as far as possible, of former Rhodes Scholars.

A Sensible Sentence.
Montreal, Nov. 21.—Carmille Pontain, guilty of indecent assault on a 14-year old girl, was condemned to serve two years in the penitentiary, and to have the lash administered ten times on the back while doing time. Within fifteen days after his incarceration, the cat-o-nine-tails is ordered to be delivered to the prisoner five times in succession. Ten days before the expiration of sentence, Pontain will be forcibly reminded of his crime by receiving five departing blows from the lash.

To Attend Complimentary Banquet.
Ex-members of the 80th Battalion who reside in the city have received invitations to attend a complimentary banquet to be held at the Quinze Hotel, Belleville, on the evening of December 5th.

Civic Finance Committee.
There was a meeting of the Civic Finance Committee on Thursday night, but there was no business outside of routine and the passing of accounts.

Milder Weather.

PENSION PAYMENTS.

Protest Against Demobilization of Staff, Britain.

London, Nov. 21.—The Ottawa authorities have announced that the Canadian pensions staff in Britain will be demobilized and all Canadian pensioners in the United Kingdom paid from Canada. This news has been received here with dismay by ten thousand pensioners. There is said to be sufficient red tape and delay about payment as it is, but payment of overseas pensions from Canada is expected to result in many of those cases of hardship which cause long distance administration. It is understood a protest will be made to the Government with a request that the present system be continued.

Britain Pleased.

London, Nov. 21.—The Daily Mail says the Prince of Wales' visit to the United States, however short, will do something to dissipate misunderstandings.

"We shall never forget what America did," it says, "and we shall always prize the memory of her courtesies and her hospitality, in strengthened by the courtesies and compliments she is raining on our Prince."

Close of Navigation.

Quebec, Nov. 21.—The Government steamers will start to-morrow to take up the buoys in the St. Lawrence route, in preparation for the close of navigation. It is understood that east of Quebec the marine department will replace the gas buoys by steel spar buoys as guides to vessels for winter navigation.

Bituminous coal miners were offered an increase of fifteen cents a ton and twenty per cent over the existing day scale by the operators at Washington Thursday. President Lewis of the Mine Workers declared the increase totally inadequate.

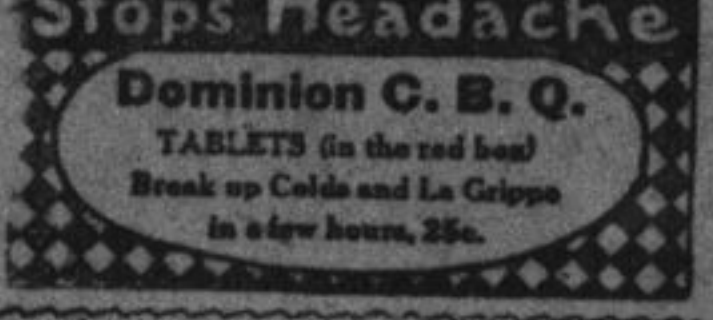
