R. F. ELLIOTT IS HONORED GREAT BUSINESS ACTIVITY

AT MUNICIPALITIES CONVENTION IN LONDON IS REPORTED IN CANADA AT THE PRESENT TIME.

He Was the Only Delegate Specially Called Upon To Address the Hydro Gathering.

R. F. Elliott, chairman of the Public Utilities Commission, and Manager C. C. Folger, returned from London on Friday morning. Mr. Elliott informed the Whig that the deliberations of the convention of Hydro municipalities were marked by the greatest enthusiasm and it was cause for extreme regret that Kingston had never before been represented at such a convention. He found that all of the municipalities took the keenest interest in Hydro Electric matters and were most energetic in promoting their claims to consideration. He was signally honored as Kingston's representative, being the only delegate who was specially called upon to address the convention. His advocacy of the claims of Eastern Ontario was applauded by the representatives and his suggestions for a progressive and permanent policy were heartily endorsed. Mr. Elliott was greatly pleased over his reception.

The convention passed a resolution asking the Government to make the position of Hydro Chairman permanent and requested that Sir Adam Beck be appointed for a term of ten years, or for five years at least, and to amend the Act for this purpose. The convention also urged that two representatives of the municipalities be appointed to the Commission, as it was considered that as the municipalities have an enormous capital invested, they should have some voice in determining the policy of the Commission and supervision of its administration. These two commissioners it was suggested, should be chosen annually at the convention of the municipalities.

In his address Mr. Elliott spoke strongly on the equalization of rates and his proposal was concurred in. A Committee was appointed to wait upon the Government and request that meter rents be cut in half, and to protest against the present cost of the inspection of meters.

The convention was entertained at a banquet given by the City of London in the Tecumseh House which was greatly appreciated by the delegates.
