**Canada Steamship Buys New Vessel.**  
U.S. Steamer Shoshone Acquired For West Indies and S. American Service.  
A further step in the expansion of the ocean traffic of the Canada Steamship Company was announced in the statement that another steamship of 9,000 tons displacement has been acquired for service between New York, the West Indies and South America. The U.S. steamer Shoshone was purchased from New York people and its name is being changed to that of "Manoa." The Shoshone was built in Germany in 1913, for the South American passenger trade, and was taken over by the United States Government at the beginning of hostilities, the vessel being at that time in the port of St. Thomas, West Indies. The dimensions are: Length, 352 feet; beam, 48 ft.; depth, 27 ft.; and will have accommodation for 125 first-class and 100 third-class passengers, and will also carry about 5,000 tons of cargo. The Manoa will be one of the most luxurious vessels in the trade, and will sail from New York for her first voyage on the 10th December. It is expected that another steamer of the same type will be added to the fleet within a month. The fleet now includes the steamers, Manoa, Guiana, Parina and Korona.

**RIOTS IN LONDONDERRY**  
Soldiers Were Badly Beaten by Sinn Fein Mob.  
Londonderry, Nov. 24.—Soldiers returning to their barracks here were attacked and badly beaten by a crowd. The police made an effort to assist them, but this proved fruitless and the troops were compelled to take refuge in the Salvation Army hall from which they sent a telephone message for help. A company of soldiers came to the rescue of the beleaguered men, the relief force advancing with fixed bayonets and dispersing the crowds, who shouted: "Up with Dublin, up with the rebels."
