HORSEMEN HOLD BANQUET

AT THE RANDOLPH HOTEL
THURSDAY EVENING

J. W. Palmer, Toronto Secretary of the Canadian Racing Association, Praised the Kingston Gentlemen's Driving and Matinee Club.

A splendid banquet was given in the Randolph hotel on Thursday evening by the Kingston Gentlemen's Driving and Matinee Club. Forty-six persons, including local members and out-of-town guests sat at the tables, and it is safe to say that never was there a gathering so representative of the highest type of true sportsmen in every sense of the term. Among them were breeders, owners and drivers of race horses, veterans all, who put into their sport a bigger capital investment in money, time, energy, ability and patience than any other sportsmen known. From the youngest to the oldest there was only evidence of the keenest enthusiasm. They were the jolliest of fellows one could wish to be among.

M. S. Grace, the president, occupied the chair and acted as toast master. After the splendid dinner, during which Salisbury's orchestra played a number of appropriate musical selections, many excellent speeches were heard, including a most interesting and instructive address by J. W. Palmer, of Toronto, secretary of the Canadian Racing Association, and sporting editor of the Toronto World, and the Canadian Sportsman. Mr. Grace extended a very warm welcome to all of the members whose presence was an indication of their activity in promoting the success of the club, the steady growth of which was a cause for just pride on the part of all. Mr. Palmer was the first speaker. He expressed his exceedingly great pleasure to be present, and congratulated the club upon its large membership making it the largest amateur club in Ontario. He declared that it was not the fast horse that injured any man but the slow one. He referred to the New York sale, the current topic among horsemen, in which eleven yearlings averaged \$1,700, one of them, "Betty Chandler" bringing the unprecedented sum of \$5,000. The tone in horse-raising is very high today and the Futurity is the backbone of the whole horse business. Mr. Palmer strongly suggested a movement in Canada toward the Futurity, patterned after the champion steeple stakes of America, and explained minutely how this could be done, enlarging the purse and offering greater encouragement to horsemen. He believed that the Canadian Standard Bred Society and other associations would continue toward its success. His plan would secure a \$750 purse for two-year-olds and a \$2,000 purse for three-year-olds. It was the only practical method of keeping up breeding to be elevated and elevated to form to the high standard of the South. The Canadian Standard Bred Society was doing very well but the Kentucky Futurity was the highest goal and we must provide for the future development of high class horses. He advised his hearers to join the Canadian Standard Bred Society. He told of the winners in the different classes in Canada last year; of the progress made by the Canadian Trotting Association in Ontario and the West; and said it was a cause for regret that Quebec and the Maritime provinces were hard to reach. He did not advise sending money to the American Trotting Association as there was no adequate recognition. The Canadian Trotting Association spent all its money in promoting the horse industry in Canada.

In Mr. Palmer's opinion it was a bad feature to permit horses racing at our fall fairs freedom from record. "Chickens" was mentioned as a horse that left not a chance to others. He did not appear in the interest of any organization, but with reference to the Canadian Trotting Association's failure to give records at fall fairs, he said many drivers chose second place to hold a record and it was a mistake all round. This matter was to be brought up and it was not unlikely that a change would be made. There were several proposals under consideration as it was considered a fraudulent practice to suppress time. Rule No. 49 of the Canada National Rules was also to be changed. He urged the club to send delegates to the Association and showed that its interests would be best protected by affiliation. Lester Berce of Napanee, congratulated the club upon its large membership and expressed gratitude for much assistance and encouragement given to Napanee horsemen. He favored abolishing all entrance fees. "Why should such fees be required," said the speaker, "when a man is paid \$50 to blacken his face and jump over a rope?" He approved many of Mr. Palmer's suggestions, but did not agree with the Canadian Racing Association in everything. He felt that young horses should not be penalized too severely. The three per cent. entrance was too high. In concluding, he expressed high praise of the Kingston club for the high-class races shown here last fall.

Mr. Grace held a warm tribute to Mr. Boyce for his great enthusiasm as a horseman. Alderman S. S. Corbett, chairman of the city property committee, who had helped the club by providing suitable stables for the grounds, and improved the track, was called upon and said he was glad to be in a position to provide accommodation that was a credit to eastern Ontario and that he was again in council he would do anything he could in the interest of the club. Past presidents W. H. Eves and W. Veale were called upon. Mr. Veale said he would like to see the club associated with some Canadian organization. He gave its history from the time of its organization three years ago with a membership of fifteen. He wanted to see still more members and more horses.

Other speakers were William Simons, president of the Kingston International Fair Association, George Trench, Phillip Watson, Louis Martin, Green E. Macleod and J. D. Boyce who spoke as representative of the press. The address was made by Mr. Boyce and Harold Boyce sang a number of songs that were greatly appreciated.

Mr. Grace announced that on Christmas Day a matinee would be held, and if the ice permitted, there would also be a race meeting on New Year's Day.

ST. JOHN'S AMBULANCE

THE ANNUAL MEETING HELD ON THURSDAY AFTERNOON

Much Valuable Work Was Performed During the Past Year by the Association—Officers Elected.

The annual meeting of St. John's Ambulance Association took place on Thursday afternoon and the report of the honorary secretary-treasurer, Mrs. R. A. Bolton, showed that a great amount of very valuable work was performed by the Association, testifying to the energy and devotion of the ladies and gentlemen who gave voluntarily of their time to so noble a cause.

Col. G. Hunter Ogilvie occupied the chair. The secretary stated that the armistice lessened the demands upon the association, but during the year three female first-aid classes were conducted with a membership of fifty-seven; and two female home nursing classes with a membership of thirty-three; 109 certificates of qualification and five medals were issued. Three labels have been applied for.

The warm thanks of the association were tendered to Doctors A. W. Richardson, A. B. McCallie, C. A. Howard, J. W. Gibson, H. A. Angrove, S. M. Asselstine, J. P. Quigley and L. S. Stevenson for valuable services rendered.

Touching reference was made to the death of Major General T. D. R. Hemming, C.M.G., honorary president, which occurred during the year. The financial statement is as follows: Receipts, \$402.81; disbursements \$366.54; balance \$36.27.

A hearty vote of thanks was passed to the retiring officers for their very valuable services during the year.

COUNTY COUNCIL GETS FLAG

FOR FRONTENAC'S CONTRIBUTION TO THE VICTORY LOAN.

Presentation Made by J. M. Hughes—Mayor Newman Asks Increased Weekly Allowance For Home For Aged Inmates.

At the sitting of the county council on Thursday afternoon, J. M. Hughes, chairman of the Victory Loan, presented the Prince of Wales' flag to the council. In making the presentation, the chairman congratulated the county on the splendid showing it had made in the last Victory Loan campaign, and also the good people of the county for what they had done towards supplying money during the five years of war.

Mayor Newman of Kingston was present, and asked the council to increase the grant to \$4,500 a week for county indigents in the Home for the Aged. The mayor, in making the request, stated that the cost of food-stuffs has increased so greatly that it was absolutely necessary that the committee in charge of the home should have more funds. The matter was referred to the finance committee.

A representative of McCallum marble works showed plans for a suggested memorial in memory of the men from the county who had given up their lives for the cause of their country. Although the council did not take any definite action in the matter, it is expected that something will be done in the very near future. For some time the matter has been under consideration.
