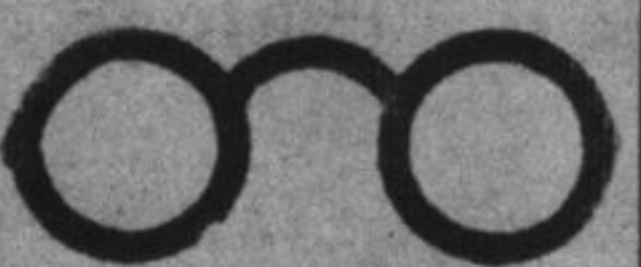

EDUCATION MAKES STRIDES

Forty New Class Rooms Opened in Timiskaming

Thirty Teachers Added—Fifteen New Sections Formed and Many Others Reorganized.

Cobalt, Nov. 28.—Education is making rapid strides ahead in the North. This is especially true in the Timiskaming. No fewer than forty class rooms have been built and more than thirty teachers have been added. Fifteen new sections have been formed, and many others have been re-organized and preliminary steps taken to provide the children with facilities for securing an education.

From all parts of the North requests for schools kept coming in until the Public School Inspector found himself unable to keep up with the work or organization and the erection of 170 class rooms, scattered from the Montreal River to Hearst.

The ex-Minister of Education (the Hon. Dr. Cody), after his visit in June, realizing that it was quite impossible for one man to meet the growing educational needs of this district, decided upon a division of the inspectorate. All the territory lying north of the Townships of Harris Dymond and Hudson, was accordingly formed into a new inspectorate. The department secured W. A. Wilson, B.A., of Haliburton, to take charge of this work.

To the Southern part of Timiskaming was added the East of Nipissing, including the schools of North Bay, and those along the C.P.R. to Mattawa and Klock. Mr. Bantier, B.A., who has been in charge of the Timiskaming schools since July 1917 is now taking care of these.

While this has considerably lessened the amount of travelling required, and reduced the volume of correspondence, it has in no way decreased the responsibilities of the large schools in North Bay, which are used in connection with the Normal School for the training of teachers, and the two rural schools, which are affiliated with the Normal.

In addition, there will be considerable organization to be done, and requests for new schools are already being received.

The special grant of the Legislature at last session is now being distributed to the rural schools, and is to be employed in increasing salaries of the teachers. A very generous share of it has been assigned to the districts.

Reports of a Change in Order by Drury Cabinet Excites City.

Port Arthur, Nov. 28.—A report brought home by Mayor Murphy of Fort William, that Premier Drury had told him the Government might cancel the order-in-council setting a price of \$17.50 for Nipigon power delivered at Fort Arthur has caused W. Matthews, chairman of the Utilities Commission; General D. M. Hogarth, M. L.A., and Mayor Blaquiere to leave hurriedly for Toronto to get assurances that the arrangement will be permitted to stand.

On the basis of power price the Great Lakes Paper Company has entered into an understanding with the city to erect a four million dollar plant at the north limits of Port Arthur and a change in power price or cancellation would likely prevent the location of this big industry here and Port Arthur is very much excited over the situation.

HEARD METEOR WHISTLE.

Lighthouse Attendant Saw Ball of Fire Fall Into Lake.

Chicago, Nov. 28.—Evidence that the great flare visible for a few seconds Wednesday night in portions of three states bordering southern Lake Michigan, came from a huge meteor was obtained yesterday.

A lighthouse attendant at Grand Haven, Mich., described the phenomenon as follows:

"What looked like a ball of fire appeared to fall into the lake about fifteen miles south of me. I thought it to be a falling star. In its rush downward at terrific speed I could clearly hear it whistle. When it seemed that it was striking the water a flash of flame shot into the air and caused a great disturbance."

Hospital Authorities Censured.

Toronto, Nov. 28.—Grace Hospital authorities were censured by a coroner's jury which enquired into the death of Josephine Zigman, of New Toronto who died in the hospital from peritonitis caused by the use of an instrument in the hands of a person unknown. The woman died without stating who had performed the operation and the jury blamed the hospital authorities for not securing an anti-mortem statement.

John Sweeney, Brockville, Dead.

Brockville, Nov. 28.—John Sweeney formerly forty years connected with the Grand Central Hotel, died suddenly at the St. Vincent De Paul hospital where he had been receiving treatment for six weeks. Deceased was widely known to the traveling public of Ontario and Quebec and a man very highly esteemed by everyone. He was sixty years of age.
