

"Having had during the year slightly over 2,900 interviews with itizens, parents, guardians, children, foster parents and wards, it is a pleasure to be able to report that there has been no friction, and I cannot recall having had one disrespectful word addressed to me or uttered

"I am of the opinion, and submit it for your consideration, that much friction between municipalities would be avoided if Children's Aid officers throughout the province were given to understand that when children are apprehended under the Children's Protection Act, such children, if non-residents, must be returned to the municipality liable for their maintenance to be dealt with. "It must prove disheartening to

an officer who, by adopting preventive measures, succeeds in his efforts towards avoiding committals and keeping apparently hopeless homes intact, to be called upon to find foster homes for wards of another society, whose agent apparently does not realize that breaking up even the poorest of homes is a serious matter, and should be considered only when every other possible remedy has failed."

The treasurer of the society, O. V. Bartels, submitted a report, which was regarded as most satisfactory.


