CHALLENGE TO THE CHURCH

TO MEET THE PRESENT DAY NEEDS IN SERVICE

Rev. Dr. E. D. Pidgeon Deals With Missionary Problems In Lecture at Chalmers Church—An Appeal for Education.

At Chalmers church, on Friday evening, Rev. Dr. E. D. Pidgeon, of Toronto, delivered the third of a series of addresses in connection with "The Robertson Memorial Lectureship," which was instituted to keep alive the memory of one of Canada's greatest home missionaries.

Dr. Pidgeon spoke on the subject, "The Church's Problem in Canada," and gave a masterly analysis of the present day conditions, throwing out the challenge to the church to meet the present day needs. Rev. Dr. R. J. Wilson presided, and introduced the speaker, stating that for many years Dr. Pidgeon was an elder in his church on the western coast. Dr. Pidgeon, who has been in the ministry for twenty-five years, is no stranger to Kingston, and is always a welcome visitor. He has given the question of home missions special study, and always gets at the very root of things in his addresses. In a most interesting manner, he dealt with the racial differences the church is up against in Canada, and also with the aggressive work that must be undertaken for the spread of the gospel, and declared that education was one of the keys to the situation. Facilities must be provided for the education of the children no matter how small the settlement. He spoke of the problems in the middle west, also the Oriental and other problems. It was for the church to give the new conception of what spiritual religion is. The speaker among other things, also touched on the awakening of labor, and also referred to the formation of community churches whereby the church might serve the entire community. There was need for a study of all facts of the case so that the needs of all could be met. Working with this object in view the speaker believed the church would enter on a new era and see the work advance.

No Hotel Accommodation.
Belleville Ontario: Many of the delegates from Kingston to the recent meeting in Toronto of the Associated Boards of Trade expressed a desire of coming to Kingston for the next meeting. It was felt however that good hotel accommodation in Kingston was lacking and Belleville being able to show she possessed such, she won out.

FACES SEDUCTION CHARGE

JOSEPH ROGERS AGAIN APPEARS IN POLICE COURT.

Pleaded "Not Guilty." When Arraigned before the Magistrate Saturday Morning — Three Thirty Ones Were Rounded Up.

Joseph Rogers, who has been on remand for a week, on a charge of theft, had another serious charge to answer to in the Police Court on Saturday morning, that of seduction, the girl in the case being under sixteen years of age. She was taken in charge a week ago, and on being arraigned in the Juvenile Court, was sent to the Alexandria School. The accused pleaded "Not Guilty," and was remanded till Friday.

There were three offenders in the line-up for drunks. One thirsty fellow said he used vanilla flavoring in his beer, another admitted having the real stuff, but did not know where he got it, and the third was in the same boat. All three were remanded.
