NO PROOF TESTATOR INSANE OR INFLUENCED

The Brothers of Dennis Owens Fail to Get His Will Set Aside.

Belleville, Nov. 29.—James and Joseph Owens of Seymour township, brought an action in the Supreme Court here to set aside the will of their brother, Dennis Owens, by which he bequeathed all his real and personal property to his wife, Agnes Owens, contending that the testator was of unsound mind when the will was made. The estate involved about \$25,000. Chief Justice Sir Glenholm Falconbridge dismissed the action with costs.

A few days after making the will Dennis Owens had consulted a doctor, owing to his melancholy condition, and he gradually became worse. Evidence was introduced by the plaintiff to show that the testator had attempted suicide by Paris green, and that he ultimately died in Rockwood Hospital, Kingston. The Judge held that while he was suffering from profound depression, there was no evidence of his being insane when the will was made, or of his being unduly influenced in the making of the will.

It was shown that Dennis Owens had led an active career as a farmer, and that he suddenly found himself idle, having leased his land, his idleness inducing melancholy.

ONTARIO & QUEBEC NAVIGATION CO. WINS

Judgment for \$65,000 in Action Against Former Quinte Shareholders.

Belleville, Nov. 29.—Chief Justice Falconbridge gave judgment in the action of the Ontario and Quebec Navigation Company against E. Rathbun, M. J. McPaul, Frank Brennan, Capt. D. B. Christie, M. Palmetoor, A. Leslie, M. Leslie, Harry Dempsey and the estate of the late John Frank Chapman, in favor of the plaintiffs for \$65,000 and costs, with the interest from May 31, 1912.

This was an action to recover \$65,000 and interest under an agreement by which the defendants, who were the former shareholders of the Quinte Navigation Company, agreed to guarantee by document under a seal a mortgage to be given by the plaintiffs for the construction of a steamship, this \$65,000 representing the balance due upon stock issued to them by the plaintiffs. Some time before this agreement the Quinte Navigation Company and the Ontario and Quebec Navigation Company, which were operating under provincial charter, amalgamated under the name of the Ontario and Quebec Navigation Company, with a federal charter.
