Died in Toronto. The death occurred in Toronto Saturday of Mrs. Simmons, in his eighty-first year. He was born in the village of Wilton, near Kingston, and came of United Empire Loyalist stock.

McCann-Markham Nuptials. A London cable says the marriage took place here on Tuesday of Capt. Sidney McCann, son of James S. R. McCann of Kingston, to Joy, only daughter of the late Admiral Sir Henry Markham.

Anxious About Vessel. H. C. Welch, of the Collingwood Shipbuilding Company, stated on Sunday that he was anxious as to the fate of a steamer which was coming down the lakes in sections. It was one of the whole of the storm, and news has so far been heard of it.

Died in Winnipeg. Thomas Conley, aged 78, a veteran of the American civil war and of the Fenian raid, reeve of Kempville for a number of years, and later warden of the United Counties, of Leeds and Grenville, died in Winnipeg on Wednesday. The remains are now en route to Kempville for interment.

Poisoned by Wood Alcohol. The jury empaneled by Dr. McDermid, of Eldorado, to enquire into the deaths of James Reid, of Limerick and George N. Bennett, at Stoua, brought in a verdict that they succumbed to wood alcoholic poisoning, the wood alcohol having been partaken of on the way from Brinklow Station to Hunting Camp, nearby, on Nov. 12th.

Students Accept Electrical Work. Some comment is being made on the streets on the fact that the students of the vocational training school are accepting electrical work in competition with established firms in the city. As the only cost of that material, they can do it more cheaply than any electrical firm which has to pay its men standard wages.

Deschamps, vice-president of Eastern Ontario of the Hydro Electric Railway Association, received a message that Premier Drury would receive the Hydro delegation at the Parliament Buildings, Toronto, on December 12th, at eleven o'clock. The gathering is for the purpose of discussing Hydro matters with Hon. Mr. Drury.

"On the 20th of December last year we tried an experiment, played a hunch that had come to one of our advertising men in the still, small hours of the night," declared G. D. Mathews, of Wetherill's, Inc., Syracuse, N.Y., in discussing the type of advertisement which had the best results at Christmas time.

"Previously we had been confining ourselves to line cuts as illustrations for the different lines featured in this section, but we were seeking for some way in which to make the sweater department stand out from the rest of the display. Of course, it would have been easy to do this by enlarging the space devoted to this section, but we didn't feel that that should be done—particularly around Christmas when every department was clamoring for space.

"So we tried an innovation. Instead of a line cut illustrative of the sweaters we took one of the garments placed it on a good-looking salesgirl, photographed her and ran the illustration in half-tone with not more than ten words about each of the seven lines of sweaters and prices or in heavy blackface type. The sweater announcement occupied as much of the entire advertisement, but it was the only one here a half-tone was used.

"The next day we had more calls or sweaters than ever before and his department outsold the others almost two to one. Since that time when we want to attract special attention to any single item we don't necessarily enlarge the space—we slip in a photographic illustration.
