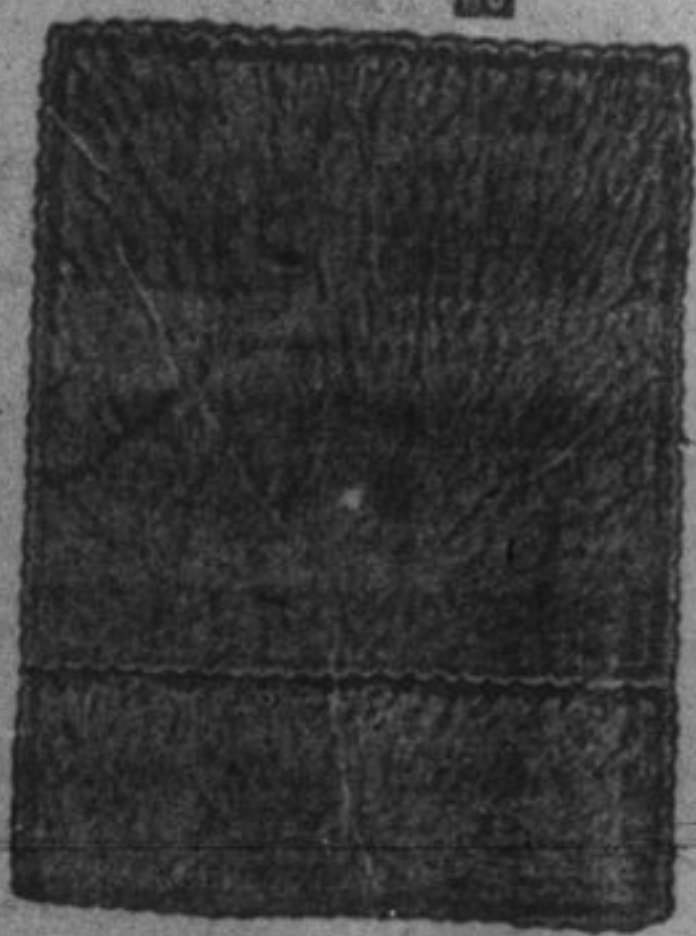

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL LEAGUE TO HAVE TWO SERIES.

The Annual Meeting of the Central Ontario Curling League — N. J. Cole, Brockville, Elected President.

Eight senior teams will compete in the senior basketball series of the Sunday School Amateur Association. At the meeting of the executive held on Tuesday evening, entries for this series were received from Bethel, Brock, Queen, Sydenham, Baptist, Cook's, St. Paul's and Young Men's Hebrew Association. A draw was taken which resulted in Baptist and Brock, Queen and Cook's, being matched in the opening games which are to take place in the Y.M.C.A. gymnasium next Tuesday evening. It was decided to play fifteen-minute halves with ten minutes intermission. The age limit for the junior series was finally settled. It was decided that boys who are now seventeen years of age and will not be eighteen before January 1st, 1920, can compete as juniors. As yet it is not known how many junior teams will compete as the entries are to be received until next Saturday.

All the teams have arranged for practices this week so as to be in good shape for the opening games. The junior games will be played on Saturday afternoons. A committee was appointed to select the officials for the series. On former occasions the games had been delayed in starting owing to some of the players not being on hand. The president informed the members of the executive that in future the games would start sharp on time, whether all the players were on hand or not.

Central Ontario Curling League. The annual meeting of the Central Ontario Curling League was held here on Tuesday afternoon. Delegates were present from the various clubs comprising the league.

It was decided to make the Senior competition a four-rink contest. The Junior series will be played by three rinks from each club.

The disability was removed from curlers who had played on a tankard rink. Any such are now eligible for play in any of the League competitions, senior or junior.

Invitations to attend the annual banquet which will be held in Napanee on January 6-7, 1920, will be extended to all curling clubs in Ontario.

The proposition to take in Picton, Cobourg, Colborne, Campbellford, Port Hope and other clubs in the Quinte district, was left to the incoming executive to consider.

The following officers were elected: N. J. Cole, Brockville, President; R. J. Wray, Belleville, Vice-President; T. M. Asselstine, Kingston, Honorary Secretary-Treasurer.

The delegates were dined by the local club, and entertained at "The Luck of the Navy" in the evening.

The matter of fixing the dates for the games was left over to see what western clubs apply for admission.

Brockville curlers and those from the Eastern Hospital at Brockville will form one club until such time as the Brockville club gets sufficient funds to rebuild their rink.

Prescott and Napanee withdrew from the junior series and will put their whole strength in four real good senior teams. This will mean that only Kingston and Belleville will have teams in the junior series.
