The Christmas rush has commene-
ed at the post office. On Tuesday,
two hundred parcels, mostly for over-
seas, left the post office. A large
batch were for France and Belgium,
going to friends of Canadian soldiers
who served at the front.

To Borrow For Housing.
At the Belleville council one of the
principal items of legislation enacted
was the introduction of a by-law and
the passing of a resolution to borrow
\$200,000 from the Ontario Govern-
ment under the Municipal Housing
Act.

tioned at a meeting of the Unionist
committee for Ashton-under-Lyne as
a possible candidate for Parliament
in succession to Sir Albert Stanley,
the present holder of the seat, who
is soon to resign. She is a daughter
of the late Brig.-Gen. C. W. Drury,
formerly of Kingston.

A lively game of indoor baseball
is to be played at the armories this
evening, when the 10th Battalion
and the R.C.H.A. will meet. What may

Fired Rifle At Sentry.
On Wednesday, the police were
notified by the military authorities
that some person had been troubling
the sentry on duty at night in the
Artillery Park square. On Monday
and Tuesday nights some body fired
a 22-rifle or revolver, the bullet pass-
ing through the window in rear of
where the sentry was walking up and
down his beat. The authorities have
a good idea who the party is, so he
had better take warning.

Rebuilding Demolished Sign Board.
A resident of Alfred street tele-
phoned the Whig office protesting
against the erection of a large sign
board at the corner of Princess and
Alfred streets. The city engineer
was asked about the matter, and
stated that the sign was merely being
rebuilt, having been blown down
during the late gale. No permission
was required for this. No new signs,
however, could be erected within the
city limits without the consent of
the Board of Works.

Solitude Unendurable.
The mother of William Bennett,
of Pembroke, who blinded himself in
an attempt at suicide after a murder
two years ago, who is now in the
Portsmouth penitentiary, made a
request to the minister that he
should be permitted to go home or
to a special institution, as she stated
he was unable to do anything in his
blindness, and that the solitary life
was unendurable. Hon. Mr. Doherty
intimated that this feature would be
inquired into.

Comes Highly Commended.
Adj. G. P. Goodhew, who has been
in command of the local corps of the
Salvation Army for the past two
years, says the Belleville, Ontario,
has received notice of his promotion
to take charge of the command at
Kingston. Adj. Goodhew has proved
