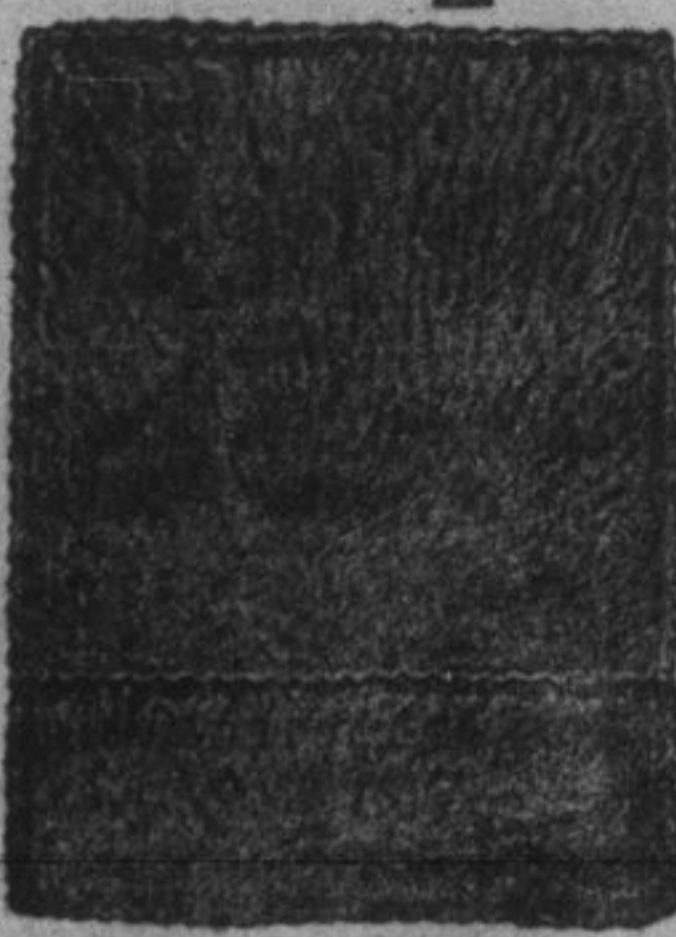

JOSEPH ROGERS GOES UP ON CHARGE OF SEDUCTION

Fifteen-Year-Old Girl Swore That the Accused Enticed Her to Leave her Home—Two Tipplers in Friday's Line-up Before Magistrate.

After hearing the evidence of the fifteen-year-old girl in the case, Magistrate Farrell, on Friday morning, committed Joseph Rogers for trial before a judge and jury, on a charge of seduction. The prisoner has been in jail on remand for several days. The girl swore that the accused enticed her away from her home, and had improper relations with her. The father of the girl also gave evidence about his daughter being away from home.

Returned Men Not to Pay Statute Labor Tax

Ald. Kent Moves to Remit the Tax and Finance Committee Agrees. At Monday evening's meeting of the city council the finance committee will recommend that the year 1920 statute labor tax of men returned from overseas be refunded to those who have already paid or not collected from those who are being asked to pay. Last week Ald. Kent informed Whig representative that he was going to move in this matter, as he did not think that returned soldiers should be required to pay this tax for 1920. At the finance meeting on Thursday evening a request was formally made from the Army and Navy Veterans' Association that returned men be freed from the tax, and Ald. Kent moved that the tax be remitted. The committee agreed to his motion, and a by-law will be prepared accordingly.

BOOZE WAS PEDDLED AROUND THE CITY
