A SETTLEMENT OF COAL STRIKE

It's Hoped For Tuesday Afternoon By President Wilson's Plan. ONE-THIRD TRAIN SERVICE IN THE UNITED STATES HAS BEEN CUT OFF.

Thousands of Passenger Trains Withdrawn on Monday—Many Hundred Thousands of Workers Are Idle.

The following formal statement was issued to-day at the White House: "It is hoped that there will be a settlement on Tuesday afternoon of the controversy between the miners, the operators and the Government through the acceptance by the miners of a plan for a definite settlement proposed by the president, which proposal, was submitted to Acting President Lewis, of the miners, by Attorney-General Palmer, Saturday night."

Elect Cheese Directors

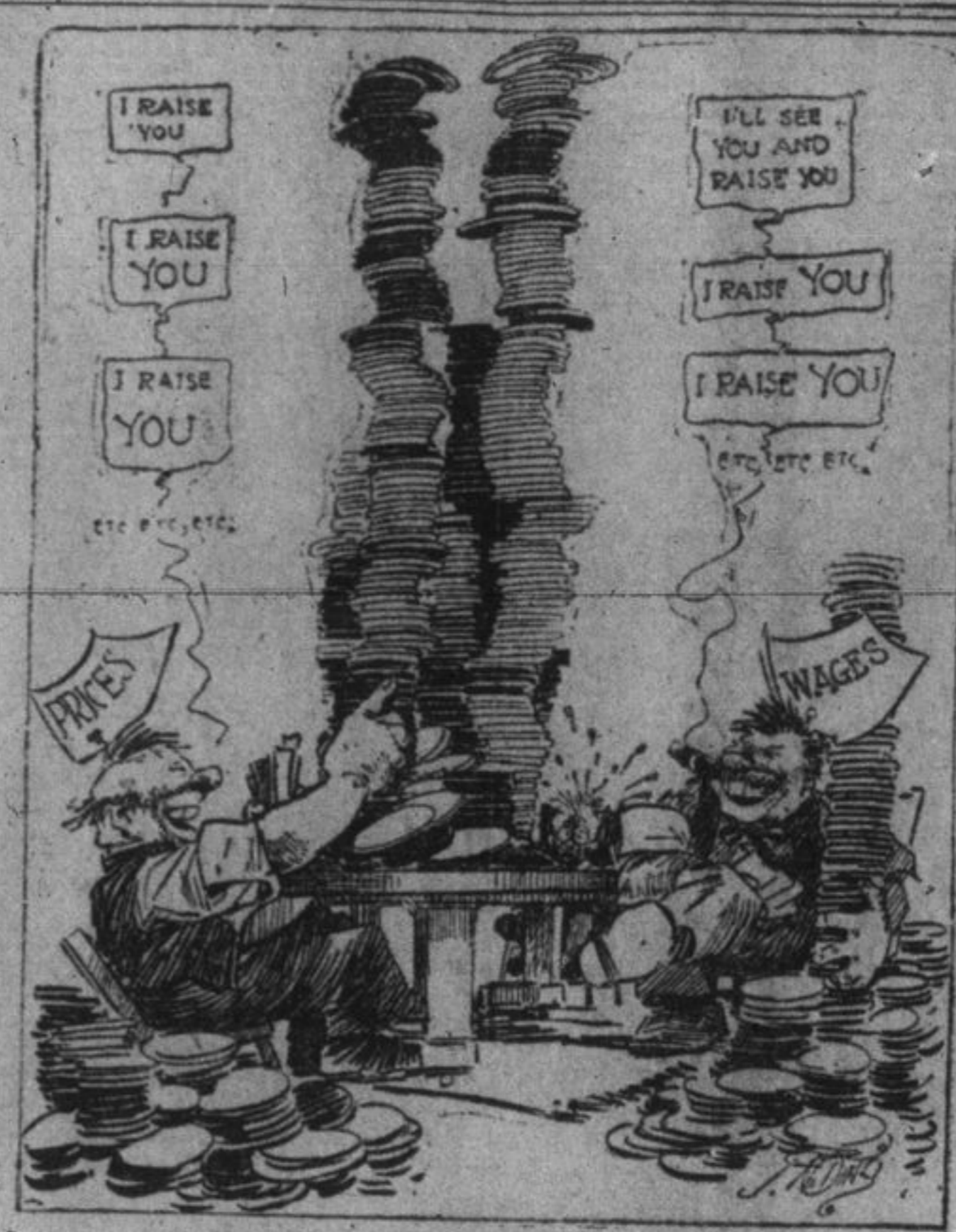

Fire at St. Mary's College

Brookville, Dec. 5.—St. Mary's College, which is nearing completion on the River Road, three miles from Brookville, had a narrow escape from being destroyed by fire which broke out in a frame dwelling near the structure by the explosion of a quantity of kerosene. Dispute Hampers the Siberians

BOTH WIFE AND MOTHER WILL GET SILVER CROSS

In such instances one cross will be issued to the widow and one to the mother.

GREECE UP TO LINE

More than one hundred thousand divorce cases are awaiting trial in France. The labor party will run a complete slate in the Toronto civic elections. Thirty-five more trains were cut off by the Canadian War Board on account of the soft coal strike. 'Jimmy' Wilde, by weight champion of England was beaten by Jack Sharkey on Saturday night at Milwaukee. The defeat of Wilde was a surprise. He succeeded in winning only two of the ten rounds, while Sharkey was best in seven sessions. MADE RAISIN WINE TO BATH CHILD. BUT GOES TO JAIL. Indianapolis, Ind., Dec. 5.—Frank Mitchell, of Gary, Ind., told Judge A. B. Anderson, in the United States District Court here, that he had made \$90 gallons of raisin wine because it was necessary to bathe his sick child each night in two gallons of alcohol. Mitchell is in court to face a charge of having an illicit still in his home, along with a big supply of wine. The Judge, however, was not convinced. After being fined \$500 and costs in all and sentencing him to serve six months in jail, Judge Anderson remarked: "I suppose this is the first time in the history of the world that a man was sent to jail for taking care of his child."
