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DENTIST SHOT IN THE ARM INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

WHILE DUCK SHOOTING AT WOLFE ISLAND, SATURDAY

Walter McDonald, an Island Lad, Tied Up the Wounded Arm and Probably Saved Dr. Beatty's Life.

The prompt action of Walter McDonald, a yearling son of Malcolm McDonald of Wolfe Island, probably saved the life of Dr. Beatty a local dentist, who was accidentally shot at Wolfe Island on Saturday morning while duck shooting. Dr. Beatty now lies in the Hotel Dieu in a very serious condition. On Monday morning the authorities at the hospital stated that they were doing everything possible to save the arm, but could not say that they would be successful.

On Saturday morning, the doctor went down to Dr. Beatty's Point in search of ducks. He was in the act of reaching for his coat when the shot-gun, which was resting across his seat, accidentally went off, the shot entering the left arm.

Walter McDonald, who was with Dr. Beatty at the time, saw the blood flowing from the wound and he immediately placed a piece of string or elastic around the arm, and with the use of a pencil shut off the flow of blood.

A buggy was brought to the scene of the accident, and the injured man was removed to the city on the one o'clock boat. Dr. William Spankie had been summoned and with the assistance of a couple of nurses, who were visiting on the island, dressed the injured arm. Upon arrival of the Wolfe Island boat, Dr. Beatty was removed to the Hotel Dieu in James Reid's motor ambulance. Dr. W. W. Gibson and Dr. D. E. Mundell attended to him at the hospital.

On Monday morning, Walter McDonald, who had been where he learned to tie up an injured arm, stated that Mr. Cosgrove, teacher of the Wolfe Island school, had shown all the scholars what to do in case of an accident.

A WORSHIPPING CANADA
