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ANNUAL MEETING OF O.H.A.

GEORGE B. MCKAY RE-ELECTED TO THE EXECUTIVE

A Cable of Congratulation From Capt. James Sutherland Was Read—The Amendments Adopted.

One of the best meetings ever held was the consensus of opinion of all who attended the thirtieth annual convention of the Ontario Hockey Association held in Toronto Saturday at which Kingston and Queen's clubs were represented. Perfect harmony existed among the officers of the big amateur hockey body and club delegates, all appearing to be pretty much of the one opinion as to the proper course to be taken to benefit the great winter pastime. The amendments to the constitution and to the playing rules brought out some splendid arguments on both sides and there wasn't a doubt in the minds of all at the conclusion of the meeting that the changes adopted would turn out to be in the best interests of hockey.

Perhaps the most important change made in the constitution was in giving the champions of the intermediate series the privilege, should they so desire, of the one game to represent the O.H.A. in the Allan Cup series. There have been years when the intermediate winners felt they were just as good as the seniors. In future they will have the opportunity to prove it. The change also gives the intermediates the same chance to play for Canadian honors as now enjoyed by the senior and juniors.

The election of the executive committee brought out a warm fight, and Major "Beulah" Davidson, former Stratford Varsity, Argonaut and St. Michael star, who lost an arm in the Great War, was the only new member elected by the delegates. Robert Park, of Hamilton, and Percy Pearce, of Kitchener, were the old members defeated. President Glover is to appoint two members.

D.H. Coles, of Burlington proposed an amendment to prevent clubs with senior and intermediate teams from using their players in earlier intermediate games. Hamilton pulled that stunt on their last season, and he sought to stop it. He succeeded in having an amendment made to the constitution by which clubs with both senior and intermediate teams must register six bona fide players at the start of the season, and these players will not be allowed to play intermediate.

The season's amendment allowing the intermediate champions to play off with the senior champions found plenty of support. The winner will be eligible to defend or challenge for the Allan Cup, emblematic of the Canadian amateur hockey championship. That will settle the annual controversy over the respective merits of the intermediate and senior champions.

Sheriff Paxton's amendment making it plain that a junior player living in a rural district, village, or police village where there is no junior team, has the right to play with the junior team in the nearest place to his residence, was carried.

The status of soldier players returning home after August 1 was settled by announcement from President Glover. "The sub-committee will deal with the individual applications of soldiers who come or are demobilized after August 1," said the President.

In future traveling clubs will collect 15 cents a mile for 10 men from home club. Father Gorman, of Peterboro wanted a 20-cent rate, but his amendment was defeated. Referees will collect the same rate plus \$5. The Secretary was given the right to appoint two officials for any game, if he considered it necessary.

A recommendation to the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association that a goalkeeper may be substituted at any time, the same as a forward, passed. A proposal to recommend to the C.A.H.A. that goalkeepers be allowed to lie, kneel, or sit upon the ice was defeated. A notice of motion by Sheriff Paxton, "that the O.H.A. adopt the suggestion of the A.A.U. of C. for the registration of all athletes with the Provincial branch of the A.A.U. of C. for purposes of centralization," was passed unanimously.

A cable from Past President Capt. James Sutherland, now in England, offering his hearty greetings to the O.H.A. convention was read.

The following officers were elected by acclamation: President—R. M. Glover, Peterboro.

First vice-president—A. E. Coppeland, Midland. Treasurer—Sheriff J. F. Paxton, Whitby.

Secretary—W. A. Hewitt, Toronto. The election of executive officers resulted: R. Butler, of Lindsay; Wm. Eason, of Stratford; Major Davidson, of Toronto; George B. McKay, of Kingston.

All suggestions for grouping must be in by Wednesday, and groupings will be made on Friday.

May Play in East.

Two Pacific Coast Hockey League stars may figure on eastern teams in the coming season. In a wire to President Frank Calder, of the N.H.L., President Patrick, of the Western League, says two of his stars are available if wanted in the east. They are Roy Rickey, forward of the Seattle team last season, and Murray, the net-minder for the Victorias.

Willard's Unlucky Year.

According to a visitor from Texas, Jess Willard, who has a hazy recollection of once having fought Jack Dempsey on July 4, is gaining weight but is losing money in his bout with the oil wells in the Lone Star State. The Texas visitor remarked that the former champion was touched for \$62,000.

Amateur Stars to Jump.

Frank Hefferman and Mickey Roach, who were recently expelled by the Ontario Hockey Association, have been negotiating with the Toronto club. Hefferman wants \$1,200 to jump professional, while Roach has asked for \$1,000. Both will likely come to terms with the Toronto club shortly.



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
