ACCEPTS FORWARD MOVEMENT ALLOCATION OF \$75,000.

Deseronto Congregation Asks For Assistance—Presbytery Must Wait Till Close of Session or Lose Their Railway Fare.

A heavy docket of business was despatched at the two sessions of Kingston Presbytery, held in Queen's College on Tuesday. The chair was occupied by Rev. C. E. Kidd, moderator, Gananoque. There was a large attendance, those present being Rev. W. T. Wilson, clerk, Trenton; Drs. Jordan, MacGillivray, Morgan, Wallace, Wilson, Kingston; J. D. Boyd, Kingston; Dr. A. V. Brown, Picton; Dr. W. S. MacTavish, Madoc; Rev. A. S. Kerr, and D. C. Ramsay, Belleville; Dr. Gracey, Gananoque; A. Thompson, Eldorado; W. Taylor Dale, Kingston; W. W. Conrad, Melrose; A. J. Wilson, Napanee; W. J. Parsons, Harrowsmith; J. Raffray, Tweed; T. B. McConquidale, Deseronto; H. V. Workman, Wolfe Island; P. W. Curry, Sunbury; A. M. Little, McDonald's Corners; J. S. Black, Burnbrae; J. A. Cranston, Trenton; J. T. Caswell, Tamworth; E. W. McKay, Toronto, representing the Forward Movement. Among the elders present were J. C. Webb, Sunbury; W. M. Macnaught, Madoc; E. J. Corkhill, Napanee; Prof. Matheson, Kingston; Harvey Mills, Wilton, Rev. T. B. McConquidale and J. D. Boyd were appointed to examine session records and Rev. A. S. Kerr and J. A. MacLean were appointed auditors.

Rev. Mr. Parsons and Messrs. J. D. Shibley and I. Carewallen presented a request from the charge at Harrowsmith, Glenvale and Wilton, to be permitted to discontinue services in the church at Harrowsmith, to sell the manse there, to have the proceeds of the sale held as a trust by the congregations of Glenvale and Wilton until such time as they may be required for another manse. On motion of Dr. Gracey and Harvey Mills, it was agreed to grant the request, and on motion of Rev. J. D. Wilson and MacTavish it was further agreed that Rev. Dr. Gracey invite Rev. J. D. Byrnes, superintendent of mission in New Ontario, to visit the Presbytery, and along with Dr. Gracey and the committee on co-operation with other churches to investigate conditions in the whole presbytery, and that the Methodist committee on co-operation be invited to take part in his movement.

Glenvale and Wilton will continue as an augmented charge. Rev. J. Raffray and Messrs. De Bois of Sulphide, and Boots and Volume of Tweed requested that inasmuch as Sulphide congregation would no longer be supplied by Mr. Raffray, Tweed be reduced from the status of an augmented charge to that of an ordained mission field. The request was agreed to on motion of Dr. Gracey and P. W. Currie.

Mr. Dewar headed a delegation from Deseronto stating that the congregation there was becoming financially embarrassed and asking for guidance from the presbytery. On motion of Dr. MacTavish, seconded by A. Thompson, the matter was referred to the standing committee of the presbytery to take such action as may be deemed advisable.

Dr. Wilson moved, and Mr. Cranston seconded, that the salary of Rev. W. T. Wilson, clerk of Presbytery, be increased from \$200 to \$300. This was cordially agreed to. Prof. Matheson has for many years served as treasurer without remuneration. A proposal was cordially received to pay him a salary, but Frpt. Matheson declined. On motion of Rev. A. J. Wilson and Dr. MacTavish, the Presbytery decided that hereafter Presbytery will not receive their railway fare unless they remain till the last session.

The Sabbath Schools and Y. P. Societies will be asked to cordially support the Presbyterial Union. Rev. D. C. Ramsay and Rev. E. W. Mackay dealt with the Forward Movement. After considerable discussion, and a little criticism of the committee on this movement, it was finally agreed that the Presbytery accept the allocation of \$75,000, and make an earnest effort to secure that amount.

On January 12th, a series of conferences on the Inter-Church Forward Movement will be given, and these will be continued at various times throughout the district. Dr. Gracey presented a very full report from the committee appointed to visit congregations, which were not paying the new minimum stipend. Most of the congregations responded nobly, a few feel that they cannot do more, and two or three have not yet been visited. Grants were passed and will be applied for on behalf of those congregations which have honestly tried, but failed, to reach the required standard.

As the manse at Foxboro is no longer required, Mr. Ramsay enquired as to the proper method of disposing of it, as it is not held under the Model Trust Deed. It was agreed to leave the matter to the Standing Commission, which will meet in Deseronto at an early date. Drs. Jordan, MacGillivray, Wilson and Wallace were appointed a committee to consider two remits—one on the settlement of ministers and another on term service in the elder'ship—sent down by the general Assembly, and to pronounce their judgment thereon at the next meeting of Presbytery, which will be held in Queen's University on the second Tuesday of March, 1920.

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
