Sir John Lavery disguised as a British naval officer, made his sketches on board Admiral Sir David Beatty's flagship, "Queen Elizabeth." It was his original intention to paint only one picture, but at the last moment Admiral Sir David Beatty decided that the quarterdeck was too glorious a spot in the history of the British navy to accept personally the swords of the German officers. He, therefore, decided that his commodores should receive these delegates, and they were afterwards escorted to the fore-cabin of the flagship. Sir John Lavery thereupon decided to paint two pictures; one called "Night," which depicts the arrival of the delegates of the German navy, and the second picture called "Morning," showing Admiral Sir David Beatty at the head of the table in the fore-cabin, with his officers on the right, and the delegates on the left, while he is reading the terms of sur-

These two pictures will be famous throughout the history of the British Empire, and coming from the palette of such an artist as Sir John Lavery, A.R.A., they are bound to be received in Kingston as they have been re-
